During the pre-show warm up, a stage director prepared us: when to clap, how loud to clap, when to be loud, when to quiet down, when to stand and when to sit down.

The set is much smaller than it looks on TV. It was especially interesting to see what all they do to the dance floor, stage, lighting, props and special effects during a 2-minute commercial. Carrie Ann's hair and makeup were refreshed almost every commercial, especially when she cried, not teared up, but cried, after a particular dance.

As the stage director interacted with the audience, Jean remembered that she brought a star-shaped hand clapper and waved it at him. He pointed up to her in the balcony and said, "You brought your own props? I'm coming up to you next." And, sure enough, at the next commercial break, he did just that! He made a joke that he had some similar hand clappers once and became known as the "clap guy," not a good nickname to have, he said. He chatted with Jean for awhile and Jean mentioned that we were USA Dance members from Florida. Before leaving us, he gave Jean a DWTS souvenir T-shirt. Maybe she will wear it to a dance sometime to show us all!

Jean was in a one shoulder royal blue dress and Marta was in a turquoise dress. So, we, including Henry, were easy to spot. In fact, we could be seen in the background between the dancers' shoulders almost every time the dancers were interviewed after performing, as our seats were directly across from that balcony.
