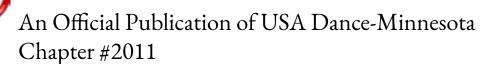

Local professional ballroom dancers, Igor Afonkin and Meghan Anderson won the Professional Rising Star Smooth title at the United States Ballroom Championships held September 5th in Orlando!

Igor and Meghan reside in Minnetonka and have been training for the last three years, from when they first became partners. Meghan, a graduate of Lakeville High School and Minnesota State University Mankato, began her dance training as a young child at The Dance Shoppe in Plymouth (now Summit Dance). Russia, was a successful ballroom dance teacher in Chicago before meeting Meghan.

After deciding to dance together and moving to Minneapolis, this couple has been competing professionally all over the country, winning at virtually every event. During their time training together, they fell in love and married. They have a two year old son.

They trained with the top ballroom coaches in the world with one goal...to win at the U.S. Championships! The United States Dance Championships (USDC) were held September 2-9 in Orlando. Despite the hurricane, on Wednesday, September 5th, Igor and Meghan became U.S. Rising Star Champions.

Only three other couples representing Minnesota have ever won this title - one of the couples is Meghan's parents Amy and Scott Anderson! The other past Minnesota winners include Jesse and Lynda Smith, and Eric and Michelle Hudson.

- Chair the Communications Committee, consisting of a layout editor, advertising editor, and website administrator.

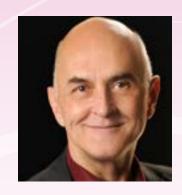

Private Lessons or Group Classes? Which is Better?

Gary has been dancing since the mid-1990's, primarily as a social dancer. He has competed locally and nationally as an amateur, in addition to participating in many dance showcases in the Twin Cities.

When I was first learning ballroom dance I became relatively obsessed about it. I took a private lesson every week and attended group classes every evening and Saturday afternoons. Also, I attended the practice party every Friday after the group class. It was hard to keep me off the dance floor.

You might ask "Which did you prefer?" In actuality, I preferred the private lessons. I used the group classes to perfect the things I learned in the private lessons. During the group classes I did my very best to maintain the frame I was taught in the private lessons. I also concentrated on good technique all around. I watched the instructor's feet very closely. I developed my sense of timing. One very important thing I observed and often asked the instructor to do was a demonstration of the specific pattern we were learning.

I used the private lessons to ask about patterns I saw other more proficient dancers do. I asked my instructor how that pattern was properly led. The private lessons are a very good place to have your dance questions answered. The best instructors were the ones who actually danced the pattern several times during the lesson. In private lessons, a good instructor can break down the patterns so each section is learned correctly. I got very frustrated with

instructors who talked endlessly during the class. In my opinion dancing involves doing not talking.

In addition, I closely watched those dancers who only took group classes. What I observed was their technique was greatly lacking. They often used their arms to lead a pattern and not a stable and solid frame. It seemed they were more interested in learning a lot of patterns than good dance technique.

It should be noted that one must dance to the level of the follow. The follow should not be led through complicated patterns if the lead is not good enough to guide them correctly. Once clearly defined and understood, a strong and solid lead can do wonders for individual technique. A solid frame will also get a person asked to dance quite often.

Private lessons can clean up the lead or follow's abilities. The lead must be very clear. In addition, the follow must let go and not 'back lead.' It is the job of the instructor to teach that to both lead and follow. Private lessons do that for both.

By attending every available class, and private lessons, too, I got reasonably proficient in a very short period of time. I have been dancing since 1996. Because I listened to my instructor about proper leading I was asked to dance nearly every dance at the practice parties. The potential partners knew I would not muscle them through a complicated step. Both leads and follows know which dancers will do their jobs correctly.

Private lessons cannot be stressed enough. Those leads who muscle their partners through patterns will find themselves sitting out a lot. Leading and following should appear effortless. The only real way that can happen is through private lessons. Group classes are great

to practice the skills obtained through private lessons. Group classes are NOT a substitute for private lessons. Knowing a lot of patterns, you cannot properly lead is poor dancing. That can be seen by almost any observer. It is better to have fewer patterns you can lead well than a lot of patterns that look and feel sloppy.

Dance like nobody is watching.... but you know they are, so take a lesson.

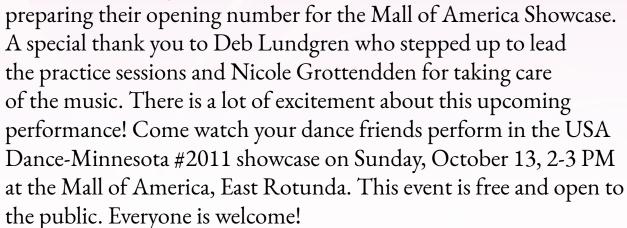

Dance Camp!

I've wanted to go to dance camp for several years now. Maybe I'm an overgrown kid; but learning is fun and energizing, and I wanted to experience it through Dance Camp—an opportunity to focus only on dance for five straight days and work with some of the best coaches in the world.

I learned there are several different dance camps offered for adults during the summer in different locations such as Las Vegas, Nevada and Provo, Utah. The one we decided to go to is the *Independence Day Ballroom Dance Camp* (IDBDC) in Washington, D.C., offered over the 4th of July every year.

We chose the IDBDC as it appeared to offer the best value or combination of classes, instructors, and price. The IDBDC is a 5-day extravaganza of group classes, workshops, and social events. It included daily dance rounds practice, social dances, an escorted trip to the National Mall for fireworks, and 'Pizza with the Pros'. The IDBDC is organized by Ruslan & Katusha Wilder, multi-time U.S. and World 10-dance Champions.

Each day started with a 45-minute Strength & Conditioning class, followed by 45-minutes of Yoga. The conditioning classes were then followed every day by EIGHT 50-minute classes offered in EACH of four tracks (International Standard, International Latin, American Smooth, and American Rhythm). Each class was held in its own full-size (40'x70") ballroom conveniently located next to each other off a central hallway.

In other words, we had our choice of over 32 separate class sessions per day, or about 160 classes over a 5-day period, included with our

registration fee! This was the program for the adults, age 18+. There was also a youth program, and a separate Argentine Tango track with their own sets of classes. At the end of each day, there were supervised rounds to practice what you had learned. We participated in both the American Smooth and International Standard practice rounds.



The dance sessions were active participatory group classes/ workshops, with delicious names such as: "Communication Between a Man and a Woman"; "Perfect Your Quickstep"; "Arm Styling in Dance"; and "Creating Signature Moves". We danced, or tried to dance, in each one of them. Some of the classes were complex and very advanced—but we still made every effort to participate and grasp the concepts. Private lessons were also available for an extra fee and we took advantage of that opportunity with several coaches.

Classes were taught by 30+ of the finest dancers/coaches in the world, including:

- Victor Fung (World Champion International Standard)
- Anastasia Muravyeva (World Champion International Standard, with Victor Fung)
- Mazan Hamza & Izabella Jundzill (American Smooth Champions)
- Jose DeCamps (Rhythm/Latin Champion)
- Mayo Alanen (American Smooth Champion and Dancing With the Stars talent)
- Anna Mikhed (Multi-time International Standard Champion)

Our local coach Scott Anderson supported our desire to try dance camp. He offered his professional opinion about which classes would be most helpful to us, and which IDBDC dance camp coaches we might want to take private lessons with. His sensible advice included giving us permission to feel we did NOT have to do everything all day, every day. We actually kept up with the activities fairly well, although we relaxed by the pool one afternoon to rest and regroup.

We were pleasantly surprised to encounter a half-dozen or so amateur competition couples we know from USA Dance, who were also attending. These couples are generally serious championship level dancers, so we were pleased to be in their company. We were also happy to see other participants our age there, as most of the attendees are younger than 30!



Would we go again? Absolutely! The total immersion into a hobby we love was a soul-satisfying experience.

Recommendations if you are interested in dance camp:

- 1. There are many different dance camps. Research which one seems the best fit for you, including locations, dates, classes and instructors. For example, the IDBDC emphasis seems to be training competition dancers. Other camps may emphasize social or performance dance.
- 2. Get in good physical shape before you go, especially if your lifestyle is sedentary. Dance camp is physically demanding.
- 3. Discuss your interest with your local coach/instructor. Ask for their support and get their professional opinion about which classes would be most beneficial for you.

- 4. Partners are not necessary or required, but a partner may be advantageous to cover more ground. For example, some couples split up and each attended different classes. In our case, we attended classes together because we could then share different viewpoints about the same material.
- 5. You will need a method to remember and organize what you learn, because there is so much information! Take written notes after each class or video if permitted. Always ask the instructor if video is allowed.
- 6. Have fun!

Dancing Halloween Costumes

If you are a dancer, you already have a 'leg up' on creating your Halloween costume! Look in your

closet...what do you see? Perhaps any number of themed costumes that could be pulled into service as a 'sexy something or another', right? Accessorize an old themed costume with outrageous makeup, hair and jewelry and of course, a mask!

Unless you are the kind of person who is so competitive that you HAVE to win a costume contest, know that putting minimal effort into creating 'something' is so much better than going to a Halloween party or event looking just like you look when going to work. Have some fun! You've seen those coworkers or neighbors with no imagination—don't join this group. And then there are those who contemplate and plan for months, to put together a sensational tongue-in-cheek themed outfit, where you wonder 'why didn't I think of that?'

The key to a successful Halloween costume is the same as the key to putting together a successful competition dance costume. You need to think through what the event (or performance) requires. You want to be able to move (and see and eat and drink...oh, and visit the 'little girls' room') in your costume. You want to be comfortable. You want your judges to recognize that your costume is appropriate (to your body, your performance and/or your event). Although some don't consider this, most do: you want to look attractive. You would prefer not to spend too much money on your costume, and you want all parts of your costume to stay in place—you don't want to worry about rhinestones or other embellishments falling off.

You want your hair and makeup to look like they 'belong' and are appropriate for your costume. Any jewelry should coordinate and not distract (or be too expensive so you need to worry about theft).

As with dance costumes, borrowing from a friend is appropriate, as long as you are able to return the costume clean and in good repair. (No one wants a dirty, sweaty costume returned.)

If you can't find a costume that you wish to wear for your Halloween event, scout out the Internet for options, knowing that there is plenty of room for disappointment with what you might receive. Note my blog/article posted in last month's Minnesota Dancer: "Dance Costumes: Buy online, 'Off-the-Rack', or Custom Created". It's always 'buyer beware' with any online shopping. Goodwill and other second-hand stores may also have inexpensive opportunities.

At my company, www.satinstitches.com, we rarely custom create Halloween costumes, as we are too busy creating couture-quality dance and show choir costumes in the late summer/early fall. We do, however, offer our prototypes (that we create for our group costume clients) at extremely low prices—maybe 10%-25% of the real value/pricing for these costumes. And once in a while we might have an overstock costume or two that is not in our sample sizes. We have some children's costumes and some men's costumes, but mostly, we have adult women's size Medium (which is our sample size). Many of these costumes that we list in our eBay store can be transformed into truly unique Halloween costumes.

Of course there are pop-up Halloween stores for those without imagination (and who love cheap plastic), or to purchase your accessory wigs, swords or various additions to your costumes. As with anything, if you purchase various accessories—keep in mind that you might be able to recycle or use them again, for another fun, costumed event!

But mainly, put a little effort (and not necessarily lots of money) into your fun Halloween costuming to help create fun at your event!
