

Location: Jannelle Huff's apartment complex.

Call to order: A quorum was established. Agenda was approved.

Minutes from February approved.

Star of the North: Discussion with Nels Petersen about THE 2007 Star of the North competition and planning for 2008.

Treasurer: Board approved Treasurer's report. Erik passed around the 2007 annual report that was sent to Nationals in February.

Monthly Dance Budget (Rent, DJ, Instructors, etc.): Approved 2007 budget for monthly dances, including the volunteer appreciation dance this month.

Tea Dance: Board members are free to help Dede & Melanie sell Tea Dance tickets. They can call Dede for tickets, or pick up fliers at the monthly dance.

he 2007 edition of the Star of the North State Games Dancesport Competition is in the books. Held at the Shakopee Ballroom on February 16-18th, the event

was considered by some to be the best Star of the North, ever. As Chairman of the event, I was very pleased with the way things turned out. As this was my last year as Chairman, please indulge me with some parting thoughts.

In my mind, Star of the North exemplifies what USADance is all about. Our main goal was to make it affordable to both spectators and competitors. With the mix of college students and adults, it truly was a remarkable event. Not many amateur competitions run quarterfinals for bronze level events. Very few competitions offer the variety of scholarships we gave out for this years' event. It was inspiring to see a packed ballroom all weekend.

A number of years ago, I was lucky enough to get involved with USABDA-MN, now called USADance-MN. Why did I do it? My folks raised me to get involved with organizations that were important to me. I started by attending monthly

dances and had a great time. I was never intimidated by the good dancers, because I knew that they were beginners at one time. And I believed I would improve faster by dancing with more experienced dancers. Back then, it was apparent that the workload of the chapter fell on the shoulders of a few weary souls. So I decided to get involved. Looking back on that time, I really believe we owe a debt of gratitude to those who got the chapter started. They paved the way for the successes we are now enjoying. Unfortunately, the workload caused many of them to become burnt out and as a result, many of them have moved on to other endeavors in life

My 10 years of chapter involvement has been hugely rewarding for me. I have had the privilege to meet and

work with some truly outstanding people. With them, we have built the chapter into one of the premier chapters in the country. Instead of just wishing about it, we put on affordable monthly dances with group lessons. We did

demonstrations at nursing homes and other venues. We put on Broadway style shows. We ran Star of the North for 10 years and hosted USABDA's National Dancesport Championships for 4 years. We have put out quality newsletters for years. With Scott Anderson, we are co-owners of one of the highest quality portable dance floors in the country. In that time, our goal as a chapter was to provide affordable opportunities to participate in ballroom dancing, either as a dancer or spectator. I may be biased, but I believe the chapter has been extraordinarily successful.

So why was this my last year with Star of the North? Having been active in the chapter for over ten years, it is time for me to move on to other interests. I am seriously looking at writing a book

about the history of motorcycle enduro racing in Minnesota. In addition, my fraternity and high school alumni association are looking for help. My experiences with the chapter have provided me with valuable experiences that I

can take with me into future endeavors. Or it may be charity work with my best friend and wife, Teri. Changes in my practice at work have also been time consuming.

The chapter has a new group of board members, and they deserve to have the freedom of moving the chapter to the next level of excellence. While not intending it, the natural tendency after so many years of being involved is to say "Be reasonable, do it my way." It's not fair to those with new and fresh ideas.

Thank you for your support over the years. I wouldn't trade a minute of it for anything.

ne of the best things about SOTN is the prevailing attitude of "why not dance"! At this competition you find many couples who are competing for the first time. Many new partnerships (even temporary ones) are put together for this event.

Two such partnerships started when a couple of ladies who danced in All Wrapped Up, met ballroom dancers. Laura Welter danced mixed proficiency with Frank Kohlasch and Regan Sauders danced mixed proficiency with Tom Nyberg. Let's hear about their experience venturing into the world of ballroom!

Q: Tell us about your dancing background

Laura:

I started dancing on my high school dance team, Mpls. South High School. After high school I went on to studio dancing. I think I took every class that was offered at my studio ballet, tap, jazz, hip hop, and some modern.

While continuing my studio training I went on to perform with a variety of groups in a many different styles. Some performances included the Zenon Scholarship Program, Phipps Center for the Arts Dances Chances Circumstances (Hudson, WI), Spiritual Fringe Festival, and the Lumberjacks Semi Pro Dance Team. Currently a member of the Starettes, a Minnesota PerformDance group, I've had experience coaching children and a high school dance team.

Regan: I didn't really start dancing until high school, and then I feel in love with it. I've now danced for such groups as the Zenon Scholarship program, Ashland Productions, the danceXchange Studio, and the Lumberjacks semi-pro dance team. I also coached a dance team for 6 years.

Q: What motivated/inspired you to learn some ballroom dancing? Had you done it before?

Laura: The Starettes often rehearsed for All Wrapped Up at the same time as the ballroom dancers. I found myself a little distracted during practice, I kept watching and trying to catch on to their choreography. With no ballroom experience, so it was definitely a challenge for me to learn.

Regan: I had never done it before, but was always

interested, so when the opportunity presented itself I had to act on it.

Q: What did you do to get ready for the competition? How many hours did you put into practicing/learning?

Laura: I found out about the competition about a month before it was to take place. My partner Frank and his wife Lynn worked with me twice a week for an hour. They were great teachers, always excited to teach and very encouraging.

Regan: I watched a lot of the ballroom competitions on PBS. My partner and I put in about 15 hours of practice before the competition.

Q: What was the experience like? How was it different than a performance you've done in the past?

Laura: I had a great experience at SOTN. It was a lot more fun than any other dance competition I've participated in. Being out there with a group of dancers felt more like a show than a competition. Compared to past dance

competitions, this one was a lot less stressful.

Regan: It was really different from any other style of dance I've done. In a competition, your team is the only team on the floor and you have about 3 minutes to show the judges what you can do. With this ballroom competition, we had a very limited amount of time, so we really needed to catch the judge's eye and give them a lasting impression.

Q: What was the best advice you got? What advice would you give someone else thinking about learning ballroom?

Laura: The best advice I received was to learn and perfect the basics. It's better to have a simple, clean routine than a technically difficult, sloppy routine. The advice I would give to others who are thinking about learning ballroom, is to learn a style that they love to watch. I've always loved watching Latin style dances, so learning the cha cha was a lot of fun for me.

Regan: The best advice I got was "don't look down". Since the judges might only be looking at you for a second or two at a time, you really have to make sure your eyes are up and not starring at the floor! I would tell someone that a lot more goes in to ballroom than you think. It's a way of life. You have to be willing to really work hard in order to be successful.

O: Are you going to continue to learn more ballroom? What's next for you?

Laura: I would love to continue ballroom, I'll definitely be back to SOTN next year. This year I will continue to perform with the Starettes and take some classes to brush up on my skills.

Regan: I would like to continue with ballroom. I am starting a dance team of my own for high school grads and college alumni who don't have a dance team to join. I am going to continue on as the Assistant Director of the Starettes.

Q: Both of you danced with the Starette dance line for Minnesota PerformDance. Will you be continuing to dance with this team?

Laura: I will be returning for the 2nd season of the Starettes. This group of ladies are very talented and I'm very excited to be a part of it.



O: What was your favorite memory of the event?

Laura: I loved dancing the cha cha!

Regan: The rehearsals leading up to the competition were the best part. I enjoyed learning new moves and working on mastering the patterns we had worked on previously.



I was lucky enough to judge the Saturday evening sessions at Star of the North. I was greeted and given my credentials at the door and thanked by at least 4 USA Dance reps before I even took off my coat (Nels Petersen, Mike Jones, Mike Youngdahl, Theresa Kimler).

The ballroom was beautifully decorated. There was a fabulous program with top-quality printing and a huge number of volunteers who were all very professional.

There was great energy in the ballroom (I love a crowded room). The music was great for dancing and the college young adults have improved dramatically. From Saturday night my selection for the most improved: 1) Gordy & Linda Davis – more polished and technical. 2) Andy Nordberg – In great shape, a masculine look, he provided a strong frame for Janie. 3) Jr. Couple Aiden Mamedov & Melanie Bersten– clean dancing.

It was a pleasure to see the growth both in ability and diversity at the Star of the North dance competition this year. I recognized many of the faces from years past and was happy to see the changes in design of feet, leg action, arms, and general posture. It is clear that the dancers have dedicated time, energy, and resources to develop their craft. The dancers can ensure continued growth in three main ways:

- 1) Keep the focus on fundamentals by keeping choreography simple. Your commitment to design of body and movement from top to bottom is easier to practice in less tricky routines.
- 2) Set a practice schedule, a coaching schedule and competition and/or performance schedule. Be sure to stick to the schedule with consistent dedication.
- 3) Don't forget the final polish! Develop a look that fits your personality on the dance floor. This means of course, be well-groomed. Hair, make-up, shoes, and well-tailored and carefully-considered costuming are a must.





I don't believe in ideal body types for a particular style. In my mind the ideal dancer is one who demonstrates the music through their body and the meaning of the dance through their relationship with their partner.


For every typical looking couple there is a champion that disproves a pre-set image. The height and body shape differences of Andre and Elena, our current professional Latin champions, show that matching height isn't essential. Dynamo Canadian champion Jean Marc proved that personality can trump height. Italian champions, Massimo and Allissia, demonstrated that a tiny couple can create huge movement in standard. Eleven-time world


champions, Donnie and Gaynor, showed that a tall Latin couple can create speed as well as a more compact couple.

In general, the more that one looks physically fit and well groomed the better. Extra

weight is never an asset. Neither is sloppy hair, a dirty looking tan, or costuming that shows wiggle and jiggle. Ultimately it is the quality of the dancing that counts. Make sure to show it in the most attractive light.


Don't create barriers for yourself about things you can't change. Change the things that you have control over like the quality of your dancing, your grooming, or your image as a partnership.

Etiquette of the Ballroom circa 1900

General Rules of Etiquette

Never point at another person.

Never wantonly frighten others.

Never make yourself the hero of your own story.

Never pick your teeth or clean your nails in public.

Never question a servant or a child about family matters.

Never read letters which you may find addressed to others.

Never call attention to the features of form of anyone present.

Never seem to notice a scar, deformity, or defect of anyone present.

When speaking to a boy under fifteen years of age, among comparative strangers, call him by his Christian name. Above that age, apply the "Mr." as in "Mr. Brown." To do so will please him, will raise his self-respect, and will be tendering a courtesy which you highly valued when you were of the same age.

It is an insult to address a boy or a girl who is a stranger to you as "Bub" or "Sis." Thus, if the child's name is unknown, say "My Boy" or "My Little Lad." "My Girl" or "My Little Lady" will be to gain favor and set the child a good example in politeness.

The Evils of the Ball

For the company to assemble at a late hour and engage in unusual, exciting, and severe exercise throughout the entire night is often too great a tax upon the physical system. To dress too thinly, and in a state of perspiration to be exposed, as ladies at the ball frequently are, to drafts of cold, is often times to plant the seeds of a disease from which they never recover.

Again, to come in contact, as ladies are liable to do, more especially at the public ball, with disreputable men, is sometimes to form alliances that will cause a lifetime of sorrow.

Well may the watchful parent look with anxiety and suspicion upon the ball, because its associations are so

frequently dangerous. If in this chapter we may give admonitions and suggestions that shall tend to correct some of the evils of the dance, our labors will not be in vain.

The Etiquette of the Party and the Ball

Each dancer should be provided with a ball-card bearing a printed program of the dances, having a space for making engagements upon the same, with a small pencil attached.

No gentleman whose clothing or breath is tainted with the fumes of strong drink or tobacco should ever enter the presence of ladies in the dancing room.

No gentleman should play the clown in the ballroom. Dancing a break-down, making unusual noise, dressing in a peculiar style, swinging the arms about, swaggering, etc. are simply the characteristics of the buffoon.

A gentleman should never presume upon the acquaintance of a lady after a ball. Ballroom introductions close with the dancing. Ladies will consult their own pleasure about recognizing a ballroom acquaintance at a future meeting.

Behavior to be Avoided at the Ball

A lady should not enter or cross the hall unattended.

No gentleman should ever enter the ladies' dressing room at a ball.

Never lead a lady in the ball by the hand; always offer the

A lady should not select a gentleman to hold her bouquet, fan, and gloves during the dance, unless he be her husband, escort, or a relative.

A gentleman in waltzing should not encircle the waist of a lady until the dancing commences, and he should drop his arm when the music ceases.

No gentleman should use his bare hand to press the waist of a lady in the waltz. If without gloves, he should carry a handkerchief in his hand.
