



Location: Byerly's Ridgedale Minnetonka, MN **Call to order:** Quorum established. Agenda approved. February minutes approved.

Organizational Matters:

Regional Meeting: Mike Jones attended the regional meeting in Chicago and reports that the 6 regions will be changed to 11 districts. He summarized discussions about how district supervisors will be identified and fund raising events that have proven successful for chapters.

Treasurers Report: Craig is submitting an annual report to the national committee detailing the chapter's account. The February dance showed a profit and we gained 3 new members.

Fall Special Dance Event: Bill has checked into the Women's Club in Minneapolis. We continue to discuss location, music and differentiating it from the Tea Dance.

Communications/Marketing: This committee continues to focus on content and board approval of the mission statement. We discussed how to better market USA Dance and will continue with this discussion in the future.

Miscellaneous: Debbie Thornquist is resigning as a board member.

Meeting adjourned with Youth Outreach and Volunteer Appreciation/May Monthly Dance tabled for the next meeting agenda.

EDITOR'S INTRO

From the Editor By Greg Moore





A Glamorous Madness

There is no sound, rational reason for ballroom competition. You might claim that competition elevates the quality of dance by rewarding excellence with public recognition. But this argument implies that the best dancers are competitors. It is just as reasonable to assume that there are superb dancers out there, somewhere, who have never had the slightest inclination to compete. These outstanding non-competitive dancers would be a rare breed: driven only by their inner passion to demonstrate just how incredibly sublime ballroom can be. True artists.

In 1996, when we were first learning to dance, Janis and I considered ourselves members of this elite sect of ballroom purists. We were infatuated with the miracle of ballroom transcendence: the conjoining of two people to create a new life form that is greater than the sum of its parts. We didn't think or speak of it in such terms at the time. We just knew we were onto something really, really big. We didn't want to be the best. We just wanted to be the best that we could be. We worked long and hard, and we were content to perform our little showcase routines at our studio, basking in the warmth of the applause from an appreciative audience.

Of course, we weren't living on some desert island in a pre-competition epoch where art was practiced only for its own sake. Many of our studio mates were competitors. Some were just getting started, others were veterans. But, listening to their conversations, we heard certain common themes: the pressure of deadlines, the expense of admission and costuming, and the bitter medicine of disappointment. We listened to these heroic tales of hardship and uncertainty with the condescending patience of vegetarians at a pig roast. We could afford to be smug because we knew it would never happen to us. We were above all that.

But, sooner or later, even a saint must face the test of temptation. For us the test came in the form of an obscure event called Star of the North. And we flunked.

Early in 1997 Janis told me about a dance competition she had watched the summer before. It was part of the State Games, an Olympic-style get-together for amateur athletes put on by the Minnesota Amateur Sports Commission, featuring everything from figure skating to softball to bowling. In addition to the usual multi-dance rounds, the ballroom competition also included a wide

variety of single dance heats at various proficiency levels. There was formation dancing and even a Jack & Jill event. Best of all, the price of admission was unbelievably low. Most ballroom competitions we had heard about sounded like endurance contests with lots of rules and fees. Star of the North sounded friendlier, less formal. We decided we could dance at Star of the North without violating any of our anti-competition values. Since there was no dress code, we could use costumes from our various studio showcase routines and save even more money. For our events we chose Beginner Waltz and Cha Cha (?!?). Then we set about cobbling together a couple of routines out of our social figures. This was going to be such fun!

In June the bad news arrived: not enough dancers had signed up and the ballroom competition was cancelled. We felt more than disappointed – we felt cheated, like children who had been tempted with candy and then told we couldn't have any. Soon afterward, however, we heard the good news: USABDA MN (which later became USA Dance MN) had teamed up with MASC to produce the next SOTN. Janis and I immediately volunteered for the organizing committee.

Star of the North was conceived as a means for social dancers to get a taste of competition and find out whether it is something they want to pursue. But Janis and I had already abandoned our puritanical attitude, made the great philosophical leap, and announced to our coach that we were "ready to compete." We weren't sure exactly what that meant, but we soon found out that our program would have to expand dramatically: regular private lessons, longer practice sessions, a gown for Janis, and a tailsuit for me. And, of course, there was the time and expense of travelling to out-of-state comps. We accepted our new challenges without hesitation or remorse.

When the big day finally arrived, we performed well and went home with a few awards and many wonderful memories. For me, however, no experience since then has ever matched the thrill of raising Janis's hand and leading her out onto that enormous floor for the very first time. In the years that followed, ballroom competition would drive us crazy and force us to learn the most amazing things about ourselves as dancers and as human beings. It was a wild ride, and it all started at Star of the North.

Ballroom/Latin-Judges were Scott Anderson, Kathryn Bratt, Nathan Daniels, Robert and Jennifer Foster, Eric and Michelle Hudson, Julie Jacobson and Andrea Mirenda. Gary Stroick-Scrutineer; Pete Maki and Joyce Thompson-Music D.J. and Chris Van Houten-Emcee created the right energy and an engaging atmosphere. We also had Argentine Tango, Lindy Hop, Hustle/West Coast Swing, Judges and DJ's. We are so grateful for the support we have from the professionals.

Large donations were made so that many university students were able to participate and scholarships could be awarded. This generosity made it possible for many to



compete at Star of the North. We appreciate this kind of dedication to dance.

Star of the North 2009 DanceSport DanceS

There is a joyful, happy spirit in the Star of the North that comes from the amazing dance communities that we are fortunate to have in the Twin Cities. The event is a special competition for everyone, from social ballroom dancers to Lindy Hoppers and from Argentine Tango dancers to those who compete at any level.

This year, the 13th annual gathering of dancers proved just how varied those communities are, and how they contribute to a wonderful blend. The event is a great opportunity to dance with others up and down from one's own skill level. There is very low stress, in part because the heats have up to eight or more couples so that the focus is not on only one or two dancers. One couple I spoke with is new to competition, though they have been dancing for many years socially, and said they felt very comfortable in the morning heats. "We were judged without a spotlight on us," the lady said.

The Star of the North has come a long way in its thirteen years. Part of the Minnesota State Summer Games for its first five years, the competition took place in different parts of the state, some of which do not have many ballroom dancers. Mike Jones, who coordinated the many volunteers at this event, said that he remembered his first Star of the North had only six couples. This year hundreds of gentlemen and ladies registered to dance in 231 heats, some with ten or more couples. Mike praised the many volunteers who came to help the event to run so smoothly. "Without their help, we couldn't afford to put this on," he said.



After the five years, founder Steve Vespested called the director of the games and was given permission to move the event to the Minnesota State Winter Games. This allowed it to be located in the Twin Cities where there are many fine dancers. It also allowed the organizers to use the same facility each year. In time, the Star of the North

became sanctioned by USA Dance and was able to keep the name. This year it is self sanctioned, which has allowed the organizers to bring in judges for non USA Dance certified dances like the Polka, Argentine Tango, Hussle, Lindy Hop and West Coast Swing. The intention is to open the competition up for dancers who more often dance at nightclubs, allowing those couples to also experience the glamour of competition in a very friendly way.

Minnesota is fortunate to be able to have an event like the Star of the North. Most other states don't have the clubs and studios concentrated like we have in the Twin Cities. Also, Minnesota is one of the few states to have ballroom dancing in its state games, summer or winter. Competitive ballroom dancing is a sport but hasn't reached the Olympic Games yet.

Nels Peterson has long been involved in the Star of the North and is responsible for getting college and university dance clubs to participate. He has helped find scholarships for those dancers. This year five colleges sent a total of nine teams of three dancers each. A total of 79 students were also participating in other parts of the competition. Nels introduced me to two ladies from the University of Minnesota dance club. He danced with them in mixed proficiency dances, which he explained is dancing by a couple with different levels of achievement or skill. Only the lower ranked dancer is judged, and it is a good way to experience competition. These young ladies had a lot of enthusiasm for dancing and laughed as they compared rhythm and smooth dances.

Both Steve and Nels stressed that the Star of the North is not really about competition, since it is not sanctioned. "It's about marketing," Nels offered. "We are introducing people to dance. Especially the mixed proficiency dances lets everyone participate at their own level. We are trying to make learning ballroom dancing like an escalator, not a stairway."

Another feature of this competition is that it is only for amateur couples. Who is an amateur is an interesting question that may be the topic of an entire other article. The latest issue of Minnesota Dancing Times has a two page letter from the vice president of DanceSport USA Dance that has this statement: "Amateurs are permitted to have legitimate jobs in studios and retain their amateur status as competitors."

In any event, there were some very excellent dancers performing and they were a pleasure to watch. I'll be back next year and am planning to dance.

Reasonably Close and Very Competitive – The Chicago DanceSport Challenge By George Roscoe

Ven though my wife, Kelly, and I like dancing at The Star of the North DanceSport Classic, we have typically danced with very few, if any, other couples in our heats. Since this year's Chicago DanceSport Challenge was a Nationals Qualifying Event, we knew that there would be a lot more competitors in Senior I for us and some in Junior for our son, Geordie, and his partner, Anna.

Traveling from the Twin Cities to Chicago in February can be a risky proposition, but for us the weather was fairly cooperative. We drove down on Friday, while our son's partner flew down with her father that evening. This year's Chicago DanceSport Challenge was held at the Hyatt Regency O'Hare in Rosemont, which is just across the street from the Rosemont Convention Center and a short hotel shuttle ride from Chicago O'Hare airport.

Normally one might expect a hotel of this quality to be over-the-top expensive, but the Chicagoland Chapter #2001 of USA Dance did a fantastic job of securing greatly reduced rates for rooms, parking, and meals. We grabbed dinner that night and breakfast the next day at the hotel and prepared our son and his partner for the Bronze Junior and Youth Latin events on Saturday morning.

After the kids were done dancing on Saturday, we all headed off by train to downtown Chicago for a short visit to the Museum of Science and Industry. Just a few blocks from the hotel, we hopped on the Metra Blue Line, transferred to the downtown loop and walked over to the Millennium Station. From there we caught one of the Metra Electric District trains to within a few blocks of the museum. We didn't have much time, but we made quick work of seeing some of our favorite exhibits. On the way back we had dinner at one of the eateries that lined the hall of the underground Millennium Station.

On Sunday we got up early to prepare for dancing Standard. Our son's two heats, Junior Bronze Standard and Youth Bronze Standard, were between 8:30 and 9am, and our first heat, a semi-final for Amateur Senior I Silver Standard, went off at about 9:10am. I found the floor a bit inconsistent and a little crowded with eleven couples, but we gave it our best effort even though we felt like we might not make the finals. About an hour later we did dance in the finals for Senior I Silver Standard and not but a heat later we danced in six-couple heat for Senior I Gold Standard. Because they were using the Online/Onsite Competition software, awards were handed out after each final. It was a pleasant surprise to win first in both of our heats because of the level of competition and the fact that we had not competed any other couples in over a year.

Anyway, with a long seven-hour drive ahead of us, we packed our bags and headed off quickly to avoid some winter weather that was threatening the Chicago area. Thankfully we got out ahead of it and never saw any of the precipitation. In the end, we were very pleased with the entire trip. A warm Minnesota thank you goes out to the event staff of The Chicago DanceSport Challenge, which was expertly managed and supported by a large contingent of helpful volunteers. If you are looking for a good competition on next year's calendar, I strongly recommend this event as one to consider.



Gentlemen Lead

People watched whatever Winter Olympics sport was of primary interest to them. Some of our ballroom dancer friends have naturally commented on the ice dancing competition. The tango seems to be the most popular ice dance, based the conversations we've had with our friends.

One thing that I noticed is that the gentlemen ice dancers put their right hand on the lady in a closed position precisely at the place where I have been taught to establish contact in our frame. I mentioned this to Monica, and she seemed pleased that I would notice that. She replied, "I wonder if the ice dancers are getting ballroom dance coaching?" Probably they do, we thought.

In order to keep up on what is happening in this very busy world, I check in on the internet several times a day for breaking news. Radio and television news is becoming more and more about talking heads giving their opinion about what might happen instead of what has already happened. To use a dancing analogy, it's like sitting on the sidelines at a dance party and telling your partner what patterns you might lead if you ever get out on the dance floor. Anyway, I saw a headline that said, "Ice dancing: Worst and best of the games. The blog, by Alan Abrahamson, criticized some of the costumes in the folk dance segment. He went on to say this:

"Moreover, ice dancing speaks directly to the very essence of the Olympic ideal, in particular the expression of a touch of beauty – and in a wider sense of something better – in our world so often riven by conflict and turmoil."

When I thought about a touch of beauty, I agreed, especially in the tango, where the couple skated with their cores linked in the same way that we do when we get "that" feeling of being in true partnership on the dance floor.

Because I keep up on breaking news, and because of some work I do other than writing, I am also aware of the way our globe is riven or torn apart by conflict and turmoil. We

can't deny the troubles and we really can't hide from them. What we can do is put them in perspective by doing something better, which obviously is to dance. Whether one is a serious competitor rehearsing seven days a week or a social dancer at an



occasional dance party or lesson, one can express beauty on the dance floor and get that sense of something better, moving with our partner. Ballroom dancing does not involve conflict and turmoil, but is the very opposite of the way of so much of the world.

Fran and I are preparing for a showcase at Cheek To Cheek in April. We are being coached, and we practice. If all goes well we will be like the ice dancers in the Olympic games, not winning a medal but exhibiting a touch of beauty. It will be a very good day.
