

### From the Board

Minutes of the Monthly USA Dance MN #2011 Board Meeting – July 10, 2007. Submitted by Debbie Thornquist

In attendance: Mike Jones, Erik Pratt, Debbie Thornquist, Frank Kohlasch, Steve Vespested, Jannelle Huff, Julie Elholm, Tricia Wood, Min Chong, Rob Eliasoff, Lisa Wu, Dan Viehman

Location: Erik's house, 1310 22nd Ave NE, Mpls

*Call to order.* A quorum was established. Agenda was amended and approved. Minutes from June approved with minor corrections.

*Reports: a. Treasurer's:* The June dance was at Dancers Studio in St. Paul. The July dance will be at Retro Ballroom (On Your Toes). Treasurer's report approved.

b. Chapter Calendar reviewed: 2 new demos added: July 20 at a Girl Scouts Event at St. Olaf in Northfield and July 25 at Menorah Plaza in St. Louis Park.

c. Star of the North update: The committee is reviewing a contract to host SOTN at the Ukranian Event Center in Minneapolis. The committee changed the official competition name to "Star of the North Dancesport Classic". SOTN is no longer officially associated with the SOTN Winter Games, but has been allowed to continue using the Star of the North name.

Old Business: a. Dance Extravaganza: Dan Viehman joined us to discuss the future of the Extravaganzas. The Dance Shoppe no longer has 4 floors available, so we discussed reinventing the event to a 2 floor dance with lessons on one floor and social dancing on the other floor. Discussion followed about types of dance and lesson formats to try. This will be an evolving idea. It will start in September at Retro Ballroom. Volunteers to organize the Sept. dance are Tricia and James Wood, Dan Viehman, and Rob Eliasoff. Motion made to reinvent the September monthly dance into a new concept involving workshops and a dance. Passed unanimously.

b. DJ Music: Jeff Skaalrud has been very generous with his time in organizing and running our music for the monthly dances, but he can no longer do it alone. We are looking for people who would like to help. Lisa Wu volunteered to start learning the system. The Volunteer Committee and Dancing Times articles can help us expand the search. Please contact Mike,Erik, or Jeff if you are interested in helping with the music.

c. Monthly Dances: Constant Contact service was used to advertise the June dance. Future dance e-mails will go out sooner since Erik and Becky will have more time to prepare.

Continued discussion about our monthly dances and how to keep them fresh and exciting. Mike suggested that the presence of bubbly Board members will help give a welcoming atmosphere and help show what USA Dance MN is about. Motion made to allow USA Dance MN Board members and Committee members into monthly dances free. Passed unanimously.

## **News from USA Dance Nationals**

July 6, 2007

Hello,

There were several topics addressed at the NDCA meeting held in LA on June 30th that affects amateur athletes dancing at NDCA events. Below is a recap of what happened.

#### Costumes for Pre-Teens

Nadia Eftadel was extremely helpful in bringing the NDCA rulebook for costumes in-line with that of USA Dance and the IDSF for Pre-Teens. Several items presented were in conflict and all were addressed to make the uniformity consistent and acceptable to both the NDCA and USA Dance. This is a big step forward for the athletes, parents, costume makers and chairman of judges that is challenged with upholding the rules. Thanks again to Nadia

#### Material Gain Rules

There were a series of rule changes proposed that would have changed the NDCA's definition of an amateur to one that would match that of USA Dance. Specifically they would have removed the restrictions associated with material gain.

A number of represented member bodies spoke adamantly against this proposal. The general sentiment was that professional dance instructors believe that opening-the-doors to amateurs teaching would be detrimental to their business.

As such the current rule of the NDCA is that only the top six couples, nationally, can teach for material gain. This being the case, all amateur athletes competing at NDCA events should be aware that they may be sanctioned if caught teaching.

Interestingly enough a case about a Pro/Am couple was presented. Many of the members at the table felt having the Amateur partner of a Pro/Am team teaching was "worse" than having an Am/Am team teaching. However, since the NDCA does not register the Amateur partner of a Pro/Am team, there is no governing or sanction action that can be taken. Clearly, to me this is a case of an unfair practice. Yes, Pro/Am Amateurs can teach without action and you cannot.

I spoke strongly to lobby the NDCA members to embrace the new wave of amateurs now teaching. Some listened and the result was to table the vote and develop a committee to make recommendations on this topic for a future meeting (Jan-08). On a side note I want to express just how heated the discussion was. President Esther Freeman and I were the brunt of many "non-professional" comments. The representative from the North American DanceSport Teachers Association (NADTA) even compared taking lessons from

an amateur teacher with taking your car to a shoddy, un-licensed mechanic.

This triggered quite a good conversation over professional teacher certification. As you know - there is no requirement of a license or certification to being a dance teacher. Of course the NDCA is not a governing body of dance teachers; they leave that to the member organizations.


Hopefully we will see a day when their rules, definitions are in lock-step with those of USA Dance to make it easier for all of you.

I would like to recognize NDCA First Vice-President, Judi Hatton, for her courage and foresight for bringing this motion to the group and thank those that spoke in favor of the motion.

## Regional Championships

The final rule change I want to review has to do with the acceptance of our Regional Championships into an excluded category for NDCA Adjudicators. What did I just say? Let me try and explain. The NDCA prohibits their adjudicators from judging "non-NDCA-sanctioned" events.

The USA Dance National DanceSport Championships and IDSF Championships are excluded from this rule. Our Regional Championships were not. That meant that anyone judging those events were guilty of breaking NDCA rules. This is now changed - Our Regional Championships are now excluded from the rule and open for NDCA judges to attend.



## USA Dance NW Regional DanceSport Championships— The Last Qualifying Event Before Nationals

Those who journeyed to the USA Dance Northwest Regional in Seattle were rewarded with good weather, excellent dancing, and a well-run competition. This was our first USA Dance competition and our first time competing in standard events. Since we planned to attend Nationals, we were required to enter a qualifying event. The Northwest Regional looked to be the perfect opportunity for us. The number of competitors in the standard events was high and we have family in the area.

The adventure began the moment we checked in Saturday morning. My wife, Kelly, overheard another competitor being told that a hair decoration with light affects would not be allowed in the adult syllabus events. When the couple in front of us was done, Kelly asked for clarification. The The USA Dance Official explained that for seniors, there are no restrictions for decorations and light effects. However, for adult syllabus events, no light affects are permitted on the material or on any decorations. Kelly's dress is covered with crystals. Since we were planning to dance Senior I and Adult (Bronze and Silver) Standard, a bit of a panic set in.

Even though we were seniors, and dancing in adult syllabus heats, we needed to ensure our outfits met the dress code for adult syllabus events. As a result, we had to either withdraw from the adult heats or buy a dress that day. Since our goal was to compete in four events, we set out to find a dress. Fortunately, our first heat wasn't until Sunday afternoon. We dropped our son Geordie off with Kelly's aunt and uncle and headed out to the nearest mall. As luck would have it, Kelly found a dress that fit and had enough length, etc. to meet the rules.

After the dancing finished on Sunday, we headed off to spend more time with Kelly's relatives. For the next two days, we went up to the San Juan Islands and explored the waters and wildlife in and around Roche Harbor. Although we didn't see any whales, there were bald eagles, porpoises, jelly fish, and harbor seals galore. Our son Geordie also had the pleasure of playing fetch with a golden retriever, Russell, who loved to play in the salt water and on the kelp covered rocks. Even with the "costume" scare, the competition was well worth the effort, and the time with family was priceless.

The Twin Cities Open (TCO) was originally the brainchild of Walter Hartell (then owner of the Fred Astaire Studios in Minnesota) and Gary Pierce, who at the time was living in New York but often was hired for coaching in the Twin Cities. I believe 1988 was the first year for TCO.


The Twin Cities Open was recognized by the National Dance Council of America (NDCA) and approved to run annually in Minneapolis on the first weekend in February. At that time, the only other ballroom competition in town was the Minnesota Open held annually in May. I believe the first venue was the Hyatt Regency in Minneapolis.

At that time, Scott and I owned & operated the Fred Astaire Studio located in Bloomington. We supported TCO by dancing with our students. When I was pregnant with our daughter, Meghan, I was unable to dance but volunteered to help organize TCO that year. Scott & I soon realized we wanted to be a permanent part of TCO. By 1990, the organizers were Gary Pierce, Mary Hartell, and me. Within a couple of years, Scott & I bought out Gary and Mary. The Twin Cities Open became "our baby!"

Scott & I wanted to bring a fresh approach to competitions. At the time, most NDCA competitions were organized by studio owners, retired professionals, and judges. Not many were organized by "Pro/Am" teachers & professionals. Scott had several Pro/Am United States titles with students like Bea Beddor, Svetlana Kudimova, Kathy Brooks (Rotter), and more. We knew what we liked and didn't like about the competitions we attended. We wanted TCO to be one of the friendliest competitions in the country by paying attention to the needs of the students and the teachers.

We could not meet hotel room requirements to afford using their ballrooms. However, our biggest obstacle was....FEBRUARY!!! Of course, we didn't think it was a big deal, but trying to get people from Texas, Florida, and California to come to Minnesota in the winter --- forget it!!



We petitioned the NDCA to change our date to the second weekend in July - and thank goodness, it was approved. Once we moved to July, good things started happening! We were founding members of the Dancers Cup Tour. At the time, circuits were "the thing" – but no one focused on the Midwest. The original Dancers Cup Tour consisted of TCO, St. Louis Star Ball, Wisconsin State Championships, Heart of America, Maryland Championships, First Coast Classic, and Constitution State. Today the Dancers Cup Tour consists of TCO, California Open, St. Louis Star Ball, Nashville Starz, Wisconsin State, Maryland Championships, Dancing Ala Carte, Heart of America, First Coast Classic, Ohio Star Ball, and Holiday Dance Classic.

In 1993, TCO began the tradition of recognizing individuals who have made a difference in their support of the ballroom dance industry & competitions in Minnesota. We named it "The Unforgettable Award." The first recipient was Marcella Groh. Other recipients to date have been: Oliver "Sarge" Schader, Mary Quinlan, Bea Beddor, Bill & Arlene Kroll, Lotti Allison, Jim Baker, Joseph Hannasch, Len Lampert, Nels Petersen & Theresa Kimler, Bill Spalding, Charlie Betts, Sandy Navin, and Ellen Ardery.

In 1997 we embarked on a project to give money to a

charity in the Twin Cities. We began a partnership with Bud Rotter and produced WORLDANCE. WORLDANCE took the Saturday evening portion of TCO & made it a fundraiser for Fraser Community Services – a nonprofit organization addressing the needs of developmentally challenged children/adults through schooling, housing, therapy, etc.

In 1998 & 1999, WORLDANCE was held at the Target Center and raised thousands of dollars for Fraser. Producing WORLDANCE was one of the most gratifying experiences for us. In 1999, the Star Tribune voted the Twin Cities Open the #1 thing to see that weekend over the Basillica Block Party!! Each year, over 7,000 people packed the Target Center to watch the professional competition. Unfortunately, the cost to produce WORLDANCE made it difficult to give meaningful money to Fraser, so the concept was dropped after 1999. Someday, we'd like to see it back again.

Since then, TCO has supported other nonprofit organizations such as Beyond Ballroom Dance Company and the Jesse Smith Miracle Fund. In 2003, the Saturday evening portion of the Twin Cities Open was a fundraiser for the Francesca Genereux Foundation, raising money for the support of children afflicted with Rett's Syndrome. We presented Jean-Marc Genereux & France Mousseau a check for over \$25,000.

When WORLDANCE became a reality, another wonderful thing happened to make the Twin Cities Open unique. Bill & Bea Beddor opened their home for a "Welcome BBQ" for all TCO participants. The BBQ took place the day before the competition began and guests were shuttled from the host hotel out to the Beddors beautiful lake house. Food, swimming, boat rides, tennis, basketball, and great conversation were highlights of the BBQ. This tradition continued until 2005, when the Beddor property was sold.

In 1997 Scott & I discovered that one of the secrets of making an event successful was the team surrounding



Where did some of the traditions come from that we see today in competitive dance; for example why do the ladies wear their hair pulled back so severely, why do they wear the "flesh" tone shoes instead of matching their gown and why do they dance the 4 or 5 dances in the order they do?


#### She Said:

The purpose of an updo hairstyle isn't to be severe -- but to show the beauty of the shape of the head and neck in smooth and standard dancing. A sleek hairdo will highlight the line of the body that continues through the head -- as well as showcase the bodies' movement without the distraction of moving hair.

An experienced stylist will be able to design a sleek hairdo that also flatters a face. A short hairstyle that accents the crown of the head will also work well, and is sometimes more softening for older dancers. Controlled loose hair that still shows a neck and head angle is becoming more popular in smooth dancing.

Latin and rhythm dancers wear a greater variety of hairstyles than ballroom dancers. These include buns, ponytails, braids and short bobs that accentuate movement. In general loose hair is a bad idea if it will block the face, hit your partner, get stuck in your costume, or get caught in eyelashes or lipstick.

When I first started competing in the 1980's it was popular to have shoes to match the costume. As more costumers came on the scene -- more professional ladies got costume sponsors. We would be sent a different



costume -- or costumes to wear for a particular event. Often the costume wouldn't arrive until we were at the competition and it became cumbersome and expensive to have enough shoes prepared in the right matching colors.

Pro ladies started wearing the flesh toned shoes for standard and smooth because they would match any gown that arrived from the sponsor. Amateur ladies copied what pro ladies were doing. Lately when I've been judging I have noticed some top ladies with matching shoes and it provides and elegant and finished look.

In the Latin and rhythm division flesh toned shoes are considered to make the leg line look longer. Ladies with bad footwork also favor flesh toned shoes as they fade into the floor. Ladies with great footwork who want to highlight this asset still wear matching shoes, black shoes with a black gown, rhinestoned shoes, or shoes with a sculptural heel in gold or silver.

In terms of the order of dances -- they have changed from time to time in the somewhat recent past. V. Waltz used to be danced at the end of the standard dances -- and still is at some international competitions. American style used to combine smooth and rhythm -- and did not use all the dances that are a part of today's competitions. I'm not sure what motivated the changes -- but do have some feelers out and will let our readers know if I get a good response.



The word rumba is a generic term, covering a variety of names (i.e., son, danzon, guagira, guaracha, naningo), for a type of West Indian music or dancing. The exact meaning varies from island to island.

There are two sources of the dances: one Spanish and the other African. Although the main growth was in Cuba, there were similar dance developments that took place in other Caribbean islands and in Latin America.

The rumba influence came in the 16th century with the slaves imported from Africa. The native rumba folk dance is essentially a sex pantomime, danced extremely fast, with exaggerated hip movements and a sensually aggressive attitude on the part of the man and a defensive attitude on the part of the woman. The music is played with a staccato beat in keeping with the vigorous expressive movements of the dancers. Accompanying instruments include the maracas, the claves, the marimbola, and the drums.

Cuba eventually banned the dance as being to wild to dance in public. Eventually the law was forgotten. Some people started dancing rumba which helped people become more aware of the dance during the 1920s. By 1925 President Machado put the ban back into effect, his decree stated: "this class of music (referring to African music) and the rumba are contrary to the good custom and public order of Cuba". However it was reported the upper class Cubans did not dance the rumba anyway, as it was to wild and frantic.

As recently as the Second World War, the son was the popular dance of middle-class Cuba. It is a modified slower and more refined version of the native rumba. Still slower is the danzon, the dance of wealthy Cuban society. Very small steps are taken, with the women producing a very subtle tilting of the hips by alternately bending and straightening the knees.

The American rumba is a modified version of the son. The first serious attempt to introduce the rumba to the United States was by Lew Quinn and Joan Sawyer in 1913. Ten years later, band leader, Emil Coleman, imported some rumba musicians and a pair of rumba dancers to New York. In 1925 Benito Collada opened the Club El Chico in Greenwich Village and found that New Yorkers did not know what rumba was all about.

Real interest in Latin music began about 1929. In the late 1920's, Xavier Cugat formed an orchestra that specialized in Latin American music. He opened at the Coconut Grove in Los Angeles and appeared in early sound movies such as "In Gay Madrid". Later in the 1930's, Cugat played at the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York. By the end of the decade he was recognized as having the outstanding Latin orchestra of the day.

In 1935, George Raft played the part of a suave dancer in the movie "Rumba", a rather superficial musical in which the hero finally won the heiress, Carol Lombard, through the mutual love of dancing.

In Europe, the introduction of Latin American dancing (rumba in particular) owed much to the enthusiasm and interpretive ability of Monsieur Pierre (London's leading teacher in this dance form). In the 1930's with his partner, Doris Lavelle, he demonstrated and popularized Latin American dancing in London.

Pierre and Lavelle introduced the Cuban Rumba which was finally established after much argument, as the official recognized version in 1955.

Many of the erotic movements stem from the original dancers doing the tasks of the day such as shoeing the mare, climbing a rope, or the courtship of barnyard fowls. The costumes that many performers wear, represent this in the long ruffled train of the woman's skirt (hens feathers). The mans ruffled shirt sleeves and or chest represents the cocks hackle feathers. The rumba is a nice dance for dancers to showcase their technique ability on a dance floor.

The rumba is erroneously spelled rhumba at times. The Jamaican mento dance closely resembles the rumba. The rumba was replaced in popularity by the mambo, and later the cha-cha.

A new dance (c.1975) called the nightclub-two step was originally known as disco two step (Buddy Schwimmer). It is a semi-modern version of the rumba, (a few say samba), it is done to modern slow music by pop artists such as Madonna etc. NC-2 is mainly done in the west coast swing community.
