

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

It ended up being the largest Twin Cities Open to date!

It was great to see Eric & Michelle Hudson promoting the Twin Cities Open and performing on KSTP-TV's "Twin Cities Live" on the first day of the event!! Eric's legs were very fresh during his performance – before he danced over 500 entries at the competition!! It should be noted that he looked as fresh on Saturday evening as he did on Thursday! Some of the highlights included another year of great Solo Exhibitions – some worth mentioning are "Charlie's Angels" with Lee Whitney as "Bosley" and his "Angels" – Leslie Whitney, Susan Hervey, and Danielle Perry! In addition to the solos, there was a good number of "Formations" competing this year. They were all unique and entertaining. The well polished Twin Cities Formation Team debuted their new "Motown Revue" number!

Gary Narducci and the Twin Cities Open Swing Band rocked the crowd on Friday evening with some great social dance music. The 2008 "Unforgettable Award" was presented to a very deserving, Marsha Weist-Hines, founder of Made for Movement. It was also nice to see some up and coming professionals from the Twin Cities looking quite promising. Look for good things in the future from Chris Kempenien & Christine Hallberg, as well as Michael Paul Newman and Caitlin Foster!

In addition to the competition, seminars were taught by some of the judges over the weekend. Word is that some of the best lessons were by Spencer Nyemchek, Nadia Eftedal, Bill Sparks, and our own Nathan Daniels!!

Saturday evening was once again a "sell out," as over 700 spectators watched an amazing Professional competition! Winners were: American Rhythm: Felipe & Carolina Telona (CA); American Smoooth: Mayo Alanen & Lisa Vogel (DE); International Standard: Pavel Cherdantsau & Svetlana Rudkovskaya (FL); and International Latin & Showdance: Andre & Natalie Paramonov (Canada).

The Twin Cities Open concluded with its traditional "Celebration of Dance" show. This year, it was set to the music of Prince. Early comments included that it was the "best show ever." It featured soloist Galen Higgins from Summitt Dance Shoppe opening the show, Open Standard champions, and a jaw dropping performance by Mariusz Olszewski & 11 year old Julia Garbuz! The latin youth dancers from Magic Ballroom danced a fun number to "My Name is Prince." The Summitt Dance Shoppe performance dancers gave sizzling performances with "Thieves in the Temple," and "Kiss" featuring Scott & Amy's daughter, Meghan! n Saturday, July 12th, spectators from across the state watched as some of the nation's best Pro/Am and Professional ballroom dancers competed in the 2008 Twin City Open Ballroom Competition. Throughout the evening, the ballroom floor was set on fire as competitors danced fiery tangos, rhumbas, quicksteps, sexy sambas, cha chas, beautiful waltzes, jives, foxtrots, steamy paso dobles, and Viennese waltzes.

Scott and Amy Anderson were the gracious hosts of Minnesota's other "Great-Get-Together," also known as TCO. It took only moments after entering the grand ballroom before you started seeing people you knew in our great dance community. What was really exciting about the competition was that even as we cheered on the dancers from our own studio, we also rooted for the other competitors as well, since they were often our friends. Everything about this competition was big. The ballroom, the competitors, the dance floor, the judges, and even the music took great effort it to put it all together. And the Anderson's did it with class and style!

There were many highlights during the evening starting with the opening competition, the Pro/Am Open Latin Scholarship. Brooke Geven absolutely shined in the Samba with her sultry moves, but Eileen Arcilla took it away in the Jive, with lightning fast feet and a smile that lit up the room. Eric Hudson, with his Hollywood charm, struck quite a dashing figure on the dance floor, while Tony Karadzhov's movements were as fluid and smooth as a well-poured martini.

The gowns were breathtaking ~ as beautiful as the dancers themselves in the Pro/Am Open Standard Scholarship. Denise Evans and Gert Roselender were exquisite as they floated across the floor during the Waltz. But it was Galina Livitina, in her blazing red gown, and Jari Muller who stole the floor as they combined form and passion in the Tango.

Amazing young talent was showcased in the Pro/Am Junior Open Latin Scholarship. Among them were Sasha Pevzner and her instructor Mariusz Olszewski, who were simply amazing. Their foot movements were so fast; I could barely see their feet. Sasha's body moved to the rhythm so flawlessly, you would swear the beat of the music was her own heartbeat pumping though her veins.

As the competition continued, the excitement in the atmosphere began to spark. The spectators contributed to this by cheering on and shouting out the names and numbers of their favorite dancers. The audience, held hostage by the magnificent dancing, remained fully engaged throughout the entire evening.

Talented newcomers, Rachel Kronsberg and Nate Martin undoubtedly improved over last year's performance in the Professional Open Rhythm. Rachel unleashed her inner goddess as they danced a wildly passionate Rhumba. They combined another year of skill, discipline, dedication, and attitude! I can't wait to see them move up the ranks next year.

Nels Petersen and Theresa Kimler performed a stunning waltz for their Honor Dance. They are, by far, one of the competition's favorite dance couples. Andre and Natalie Paramonov from Canada blew away the competition in the Professional Showdance and Professional Open Latin. Their dancing and the off-the-chart costumes were so hot; I'm surprised the alarms didn't go off!

One of the attractions to competitive ballroom dancing is the sheer grace of the dancers' movements and the brilliance of their routines. They make it look so effortless. But that is the illusion of competitive ballroom dancing. That effortlessness takes years of practice and hard work. Many of these dancers have been dancing their whole lives and their professionalism shined through on the final night of the competition. Saturday evening was the night of the Professional Division Finals. Couples competed from 8 pm until well after 11pm, which included several costume changes for many of the dancers. A long night to be sure, especially when you consider many of them had been dancing and competing since Thursday! A true test to their professionalism showed on the last night of competition. When they were the most tired was when they had to perform at their best. To witness their level of training and devotion was truly inspiring.

I want to thank Scott & Amy Anderson, the competitors, the dancers, the judges, and the Dream Team for putting together a wonderful and exciting event. Bravo! Bravo!

y partner and I danced for the first time at TCO this year! Excited and slightly intimidated, we registered in the 'Newcomers' category for 5 dances (3 smooth and 2 rhythm); and then in a burst of bravado, registered for the same five dances in the 'pre-bronze' category. We figured if we really screwed up, registering twice would give us a second chance! This was our first competition, and we worked hard with our instructors to get it right.

The results? We actually did well by placing first in most of our categories – not because we are superb dancers (we know better than that!), but because there was little competition. There were very few amateur couples. Although we loved the whole experience, we came to understand that TCO is a primarily a pro-am competition; a chance for the teachers to shine; and for the students to show off the skills they have paid for with lots of time and money; in effect, a dance recital for students and teachers. (And frankly, some of the talent is absolutely, breathtakingly, fabulous!)

Many of our social dancing friends attended the event, but only as spectators. When asked why they did not compete (many are better dancers than we are), their general response was one of intimidation, of not being ready, or claiming to prefer social dancing. All of which may be true, but we think an extra effort at newcomer outreach would produce more amateur competition.

I should mention that Newcomers dance early in the morning (8-ish); which is good in that the crowds are thin at that time of day, but bad if you're a night owl like me! Hey, I see it as just another motivator to dance better, in order to be able to compete in categories that dance, say, at noon?!

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Magic Shortcuts... or Magic Teachers?

Yve never laughed so hard in a dance studio, nor learned so much...

To ballroom enthusiasts such as myself, who participate or watch ballroom competitions, Gene Bersten and Zhanna Vayntrub a must-see. Also simply known as Gene and Zhanna, they were the wonder teenagers who dazzled us with very advanced International Latin dancing that made people wonder if they were already professionals. And how did they get so good at what they do? Their level of dancing is very uncommon to see in the Twin Cities, even the Midwest.

Well, they are now adults, ranked 10th in the nation in Amateur International Latin, and are proud and very capable teachers at Magic Ballroom. I taking dance instructions from Gene and Zhanna in the spring of 2007. I'd been dancing for 3 years, on a more accelerated path, and thought Gene would start teaching me the tricks and fabulous moves he had been doing with Zhanna. But to my discomfort, he made me go back to the basics! It went against the grain, but I saw the error of my complaining ways when a couple months later, I got a lot of compliments from my peers. They told me my technique had improved so much and they asked what I had been doing to achieve this? Well, more than the vitamins I take, it is definitely the high quality of teaching I get from Magic.

It is quite remarkable, watch Gene and Zhanna teach and practice. Both are not yet 21, but both are very mature for ages. They are arguably the best teachers of International Latin in the area. With the breadth and depth of their knowledge, impressive work ethic, and friendly dispositions, they are comparable to the other instructors who have been in the business for many years. I feel lucky to be one of their students. They insist their students learn and dance using proper technique at ALL TIMES. Admittedly, we sometimes complain about it, but we know we are getting our money's worth. Through the pain of proper posture, consistently pointed toes, and making sure we are not back-weighted, we greatly appreciate their dedication.

The best advice I got from them, besides, practice, practice, practice...is for me to get additional instruction from other instructors, and also to learn other dance styles such as Standard, Ballet, Jazz or even Hip-Hop! With their experience, they know it takes more than one good instructor and more than one style for a student to evolve in dance. And it is a testament to their sincerity and caring for their students that they want us to do this for ourselves.

That's the dancing part, so where does the laughter come in? Well, Gene and Zhanna can actually be hams off the

dance floor! It was a pleasant surprise to learn this, after seeing them perform so seriously during competitions. Lessons and practice can be a grueling and exhausting, especially before a comp, but part of the allure for me to go to Magic Ballroom is to hang out with them. They are very funny, good-natured people



when they are not in competition dance mode. But once the music starts, they expect nothing less than the best effort from their students.

For ballroom dancers who want to improve their International Latin, I highly recommend going to Gene and Zhanna for a lesson or two. I promise that you will be glad you did and that your peers will definitely notice!

n June 29, 2008, for DanSa organized the Sichuan Earthquake Fundraising Dance Party held at ERV Dance Studio in Hopkins. This fundraising dance party was co-sponsored by USA Dance-MN and ERV Dance Studio. The primary goal for the fund-raising dance party was to raise relief funds for the victims of the Sichuan earthquake (see side bar for the description of damage caused by this powerful earthquake). There were also other goals, which include: building bridges between the Chinese American and the USA Dance-MN Dance communities; promoting ballroom dance in the Chinese American communities; and informing the ballroom community about the other fund-raising efforts by local Chinese American communities.

On the Sunday afternoon of the party, about 70 dancers came to support the fund-raising effort. The party started with a complimentary Mambo lesson taught by forDanSa. More than thirty people took the lesson and everybody did a wonderful job learning the bronze and silver Mambo steps.

After about an hour of general dancing, Eric Pratt, who graciously served as the MC, announced the beginning of the demo program. He skillfully introduced the performers and their dances. The performance program featured three solo smooth dances, a group dance and two formation teams. There were a variety of dances presented, which included American Waltz, American Foxtrot, International Waltz, Viennese Waltz, Rumba, Samba, Paso Doble and Jazz dance. Each dance has it own characteristics and distinct style, and each received enthusiastic applaud from the audience. The performers were Tom LaTourelle, Anne LaTourelle, Mark Tepley, Karen Tepley, Misha Mikhail, Mieko Iikawa, Lisa Wu and Daniel Lai.

As reported at the conclusion of the party at 6 p.m., we had collected \$630 in fees. More people pledged additional donations after the party; they are: William & Mieko Li, Jenny Lee, Echo Huang, Chun-Lin Hsu, Lisa Wu and Daniel Lai. Many of these people are multiple donors



to earthquake relief funds at other events.

Beside this fundraising ballroom dance party, the two community



ballroom dance organizations, CABDA and forDanSa, are part of the local Earthquake Relief Team (MN512) that have organized fundraising activities in the past two months. Through the efforts of many volunteers and the generosity of many merchants and donors, the MN512 group has collected \$114,000 in donation and all of them had been sent to the Sichuan Red Cross. Once forDanSa collected all the pledged donations from the dance party, forDanSa will send the money to Sichuan Red Cross thru the MN512 group and the wire transfer receipt will be given to the USA Dance-MN Board and ERV Dance Studio for review.



As you know, on May 12, a massive earthquake, measuring 8.0 on the Richter scale, rocked the mountainous region in China's Sichuan Province, resulting in the deaths of 69,195 people—with 374,176 injured and 18,389 still missing; 7.79 million houses collapsed, 24.57 million damaged, 46.24 million people directly affected by this earthquake. No doubt, it is one of the worse natural disasters in the recent history of mankind. Many cities, towns, and villages need to be rebuilt. According to the World Health Organization (WHO), 15,158 aftershocks have been detected; among them 127 aftershocks measured at 4-6 on the Richter scale. 


I am studying hip hop, ballet and modern. I live in Minnetonka and our studio is located in Hopkins.

Dance into your Best Life^o – Presence of Being

The dance of life

There are many metaphors in dance that can be applied to our lives. For example, if a person is not clear in the change of direction that is being made on the dance floor, the execution of the step is weak at best. This is true in life as well. Having clarity in direction can create a powerful movement toward the accomplishment of your goals.

Another metaphor, and the one to focus upon in this article is called Presence of Being. This is the first module in Jeff Nehrbass' and my program called – Dance into your Best Life®. And I believe it is the most important module. Presence of Being sets the foundation in your dance, in this program, and most certainly in life. Why? Let's discuss...

Dance requires being present

Dance requires a person to be present. In fact, it is hard to dance if you are not present and I believe that is why dancing is so enjoyable. You cannot think about your past concerns or future anxieties and execute a dance step in the moment. Golf is similar, if you are not present; it is hard to hit the ball well.

However, even though dance requires present mind awareness, it is still a common problem we see when teaching. It is especially true when new steps are being introduced and even in choreographed routines. A person can be concerned about the next step even before they complete their current step. The step will then be stunted, not completely executed, and will lack partnership. As a result, the dance becomes a series of steps rather than a flowing movement.

Breathe to become present

One of the easiest and most effective ways to become present is to engage your breath. When you breathe, it helps to release other thoughts and bring awareness to our bodies and the present moment. When you are present, you allow for presence of being to engage.

In fact, breathing is so powerfully significant, programs to learn to breathe effectively are popping up all over. This may be new in western society, but it is old wisdom to eastern traditions that teaches the power of our breath through Yoga and QiGong. An old yogi expression is "Master of breath is master of life".

In 1995, I found this wisdom for myself. After attending Miracle of the Breath weekend workshops, my life changed in significantly positive ways. So much so I decided to teach it. After 12 years of study with teachers including Andy Caponigro, an internationally known breath master, I continue to be convinced that the breath is one of the most powerful tools we have in reach...and it is FREE. Presence in life

In this moment, take a look. Are you present? Or are you wrapped up in your thoughts, concerns about the next moment, or the past moment, or thoughts about these ideas as you read this article? Are you really present?

In Eckhart Tolle's books, The Power of Now and most recently, A New Earth, he stresses the importance of being present. I'm



grateful to Oprah to have this information become so easily available. Her recent webcast touched people from all over the world. What exciting times we're living.

As they discussed, our awareness, our creative essence, our beingness – our Presence of Being exists in the moment ...and so does our dance. Next time notice as you watch someone dancing with Presence of Being. It is engaging!

topics in this column. One friend said, "It is interesting to see your newcomer perspective and it will be interesting to see what you write four years from now." Another friend wondered if I would be dancing four years from now. So, why do I presume to write here?

I started taking lessons and going to the dances to please Fran. I first discovered her passion for dance, and found joy in her joy. Then I discovered that I have passion in dancing too. At the wedding of our granddaughter in May, I danced with the mother of the bride. Our daughter has her own style, does her own thing, but when I took her two hands, lifted them and led her into a cuddle, she squealed with joy, saying, "Jack, I could follow that!" It may be crude or primitive art at this stage in our learning, but that is the Art of Ballroom Dancing.

A Steamy South Central Regional Event


Baton Rouge, Louisiana

I've heard different opinions about the closed hold for International Standard (or American). Where should the connection be? Are there different schools of thought?

He Said:

The dance frame, or close hold, is somewhat influenced by a couples' physical limitations or blessings. It seems that the classic dance frame from the days of Bill and Bobby Irvine (former world Standard Champions) has evolved into to a frame that allows for more freedom on the lady's part. The Standard dancing of today has a greater emphasis on speed and power, sometimes at the expense of showing the artistry and character of the dance. Whichever frame you prefer, make sure it fits your style of dancing and that you have room to grow as a dancer.

She Said:


There are different schools of thought in all styles of dancing. The Standard has proponents of higher and lower connections and square and round styles of dance. Some coaches teach power and pushing with a lower connection almost leaning away from one's partner for volume, while others teach softness, swing, and a higher connection, with flexibility from the lady that is initiated by the man.

Over the years we have seen proponents of two bodies curving around each other, hips towards each other, two bodies parallel, two bodies with an 'air gap', balanced bodies with hips under shoulders, bodies leading



backwards into hula-hoop's. There are always different approaches. Some are based on principles of good dancing and some are just trends developed by teachers who see a 'look' and try to emulate it without understanding how it is created.

Ultimately it is important to work with teachers and coaches who teach the same or complimentary styles as each other. As a coach I've seen couples spread themselves too thin by working with a variety of people who are proponents of oppositional techniques. Sometimes, students spend a lot of money and wind up confused by not being experienced enough to realize they are trying to incorporate opposing techniques. The best thing a couple can do for themselves is to pick one main coach who has an interest in their dancing, their choreography, and their presentation. Use this coach as a sounding board for who would be complimentary to work with and who would not.
