

FROM THE BOARD

Minutes of the Monthly Meeting of the USABDA-MN Board of Directors by Melanie Helvig

President Ellen Ardery called the meeting to order at the TCFU in Golden Valley at 7:32pm. There were 17 members present.

- We have sold 73 squares of floor, totaling \$3,015. More squares need to be sold. The budget expectation is \$11,500.
- Membership: Total members are 333. Eight new members joined in October, plus seven subscribers.
- Communications: Hotline is busy. Newsletter --- a new print service will be tried in an effort to save money on printing costs. Newsletter staff are continuing to try new things.
- Gary Stroick gave an update on National activity. In the fall of 2000 the
 U.S. will host the World Latin Dance Championships. Watch your TV
 listings for two upcoming ballroom events. National requires a list of
 participants with signatures and ID #'s for those dancers doing demo events.
 All participants in demos must be USABDA members. Yvonne Viehman
 will be checking and forwarding this info to National.
- Yvonne Viehman reports that by year-end the demos left will net us \$500-700 in revenue.
- Monthly dances: December 21, Twin Cities Ballroom, swing lesson with Nathan Daniels. January 16, Birthday Dance --- Jack & Jill comp to be planned. Membership will be polled to determine interest in a second monthly dance --- see survey in this issue.







Just five short months ago, I was created. I was then just a vision — a concept in the minds of USABDA-MN and Scott & Amy Anderson. They calculated, by cost, my value and dimensions. It was a first for them, but I knew they'd take the plunge because I'm worth it! I can be arranged to the size of 50' x 100', or 60' x 80', and tonight you're seeing only half of me!

Yes, I'm made up of 544 squares, just 3'x3' each. It takes roughly two hours to set me up, but even less time to take me down and maintain. And yes, a hefty sum was paid for my purchase: \$40,000 plus! But remember. I will provide long-lasting enjoyment as I cushion your knees, add spring to your step, and help you glide across me! This cloud of debt is only temporary, and soon I will be providing you profit as you rent me out to your dancing friends.

Advice From The Pros: THE ART OF SOCIAL DANCING

The purpose of social dancing is right there in the name: to dance as a social activity. Lessons and competition have the goal of doing the "right" thing. Social dancing has the goal of being social — having fun and doing "your" thing.

That being said, there are some rules. It's a lot like any other social activity. In conversation you want to contribute to the discussion, but you should also let other people have their say. At a dance party you can get the dances you want and dance the way you want --- as long as you allow your partner of the moment and other dancers to enjoy themselves, too.

First of all, make your own party. If you want to dance, ask! If you are uncomfortable asking, stay near the floor and show your readiness to dance. It is not up to the other dancers to rescue you from your chair and make you have a good time.

The flip side of that is recognizing that everyone else is trying to get their dances. If someone asks you to dance and you don't want to, do try it anyway --- unless they're really a problem, or you're exhausted, or in the middle of a good conversation or appetizer. It's only two minutes of your life. If you absolutely do not want to dance, explain why you're sitting out, and don't accept a dance with anyone else until the song is over. When you get your dance have a good time, but watch for others on the floor. Before you kick or swing your arm, make sure there is room for it. And if you are free and see someone waiting for a dance, remember how that feels (we all know).

Guys, take care of your lady. This doesn't mean do everything for her. It means make sure she is comfortable. Before you start to move make sure that the lady is on balance and that your position together is good. Try not to affect her balance while you're moving. Lead what you both can follow. Try a new or fancy step --- but if it doesn't work, leave it out. If the lady feels unsure of her part, she'll be nervous and reluctant to repeat the experience. The goal here is to enjoy the social activity, not to do a solo act or impress anyone.

Ladies, be appreciative of the work your man is doing for you, and help him out when you can. The man leads, but he doesn't do your part. Make sure you are always on your own balance, and move *yourself* where his lead directs you. You will only be ready to follow him if you keep all your weight over your own feet. If he is pulling on your arm, let your arm go limp. Sacrifice some connection for the sake of your rotator cuff. And, if a crash behind him is imminent, let him know by a squeeze of your left hand or a verbal warning.

Social dancing is a time to enjoy. It is not a time to judge. A "mistake" may even take you into an interesting new pattern. I bet a lot of standard patterns were invented that way! Even if you partner is not as skillful as you want them to be, that person is your partner for that dance. Enjoy what they bring to the floor, appreciate their effort, and remember that you, too, were once starting out. A dance is gone as soon as it's made, but you can make the most of it together for those fleeting moments.

- 3. Volunteers will be needed.

Years of lackluster participation in the Ballroom Dance event at the Minnesota State Games and the last-minute cancellation of the 1997 event (only five couples entered) compelled me to find a way to turn things around, to develop a regional competition that would showcase the talent of the Twin Cities and surrounding communities.

In the summer of 1997 I contacted the office of the Minnesota State Games and proposed that USABDA-MN be brought in to produce and direct the ballroom event in 1998. Their response was very enthusiastic. That September, with approval from the USABDA-MN board of directors, I organized a committee of eager, ambitious individuals to start work on our first "STAR OF THE NORTH" dancesport competition.

Our deadline was March 1998. There was little time and much to be done. Many volunteers were needed so that no one would feel overwhelmed. Fortunately, I had a very organized co-chair, Julie Chase, who handled many tasks that might have gotten away from us. With help from Dave Schmidt, we secured the Great Hall at the historic First Trust Center in St. Paul (now the U.S. Bank Trust Center). It would be a magnificent ballroom venue, as regal as any in the nation. Now all we had to do was prepare music, schedule events, print registration forms, order medals, find vendors, hire judges, print programs, organize volunteers, provide refreshments, and send out advertisements. AND: we needed a dance floor.

On Friday, March 13 we held a pre-comp Welcome Dance at the Twin Cities Ballroom. This would allow contestants to check in ahead of time, especially the out-of-towners, and to relax & socialize. Saturday, March 14 was the day our committee had all been waiting for, and it came all too soon. Most of us were also competing that day, but we were more nervous about running the comp than we were about dancing.

It was exciting to see dashing competitors from Wisconsin, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, and Ohio going up against our own local heroes. But the big crowd began to take its toll on our

lovely schedule. We had more dancers (130) and more events (200+) than we were expecting. At times that vast dance floor looked a little crowded. We had started promptly at 9:30am, but, an hour later, we were already running 45 minutes late. Even with the stalwart Nels Petersen as on-deck captain, expertly wrangling those pesky dancers, we had to forego the lunch break and keep pushing things along. And we still didn't finish the last event until 7:30pm.

We knew we absolutely had to give everybody a dinner break, during which they could freshen up for more festivities that evening the championship honor dances, a Jack & Jill event, and a team match. At 1:00am on Sunday morning the committee was clearing away the last remnant of the 1997 Star of the North. It had been six months of hard work, but it was a labor of love. Our rewards were seeing everyone having a great time, seeing new dancers competing for the first time, and seeing new dance partnerships form.

We took only one month off before digging into our next project the 1999 Star of the North. Next year's show will be bigger and better. Same fabulous venue, and our beautiful new USABDA-MN floor to dance on. This time around we are scheduling pro/am and am/am solo events on Friday evening. Our theme, once again, is participation. We want to offer everyone a fun, low-stress, and low-cost opportunty to enjoy a truly exciting dance competition. And the program includes just about everything from Viennese waltz to country two-step. Even if you've never competed before, give it a try! If you don't wish to compete, but would like to help, please contact me or any of our dedicated committee members: Julie Chase, Elaine Barrett, Nels Petersen, Greg Moore, Janis Livingston, Dan Viehman, Gary Stroick, and Mike Youngdahl. There is currently a position open on the committee for someone who can coordinate corporate donations and sponsorships, so that we can keep this competition as affrdable as possible.

Wendi Davies, three-time United States representative to the world, and our own fabulous nine-dancer Julie Jacobson have agreed to judge the solo exhibitions on Friday evening, March 19. Partnership Profile, part 2:

NELS PETERSEN and THERESA KIMLER

"See that?" asks Nels, pointing at the image on the TV screen, "Your shoulders are back too far." "You think I don't know that?" Theresa replies wearily, dabbing the perspiration from her brow. USABDA Nationals are two weeks away. A dozen or so ballroom contenders, wheezy and dripping, have just finished yet another practice round and are crowded around a VCR, watching themselves on videotape. A half-eaten banana lies limp and forgotten on the window sill. An ancient air conditioner struggles to keep up with the rising heat and humidity. Morale teeters weakly on the thin line between exhaustion and panic. Nels and Terri hope to bag their seventh U.S. Open Rhythm title. Their chances are very good. But they must face another battle: Championship International Standard. And they know they cannot win.

American Smoothies like myself sometimes forget that we are a small minority in the land of ballroom, limited mainly to this country's mid-section. Outside our cozy little corner of the globe, it is Standard that rules. European schoolchildren know far more Standard syllabus than I. "When I'm over there,' says Nels, "and I tell someone I've been dancing Standard for seven years, they just laugh."

At USABDA Nationals, a dozen couples is a typical preliminary round at any level of American Smooth. A typical preliminary Standard round must be divided into four groups of a dozen couples each. At the 98 Nationals, four groups of seventeen couples started the Championship Standard event. Imagine the field at a national competition in Europe.

By the time Terri partnered up with Nels in 1994, he had already won the 1992 U.S. Pro-Am Standard Championship (he did it again in 1997). Once they had taken several Rhythm titles, she decided it was time to expand the scope of their partnership, and asked him about dancing Standard. Instead of yes or no, he gave her a homework assignment "I had to write out all my reasons for wanting to compete in Standard. It really made me think about my motives and goals." She and Nels were already training very, very hard. Getting up to competition speed in Standard would mean a huge additional committment of time, money, and sweat "To compete in championship Standard in less than five years is rare," Nels explains. "After ten years very few couples reach the top twelve." He felt she should be absolutely positive that this was what she wanted. Terri cranked out a three-page essay. And so, in January of 1998, they ventured out into International waters.

They began working with top coaches, such as Wendi Davies ("She's an architect --- she can explain technique with incredible clarity."), Timothy & Michelle Mason (winners at the '97 Ohio Star Ball), and Scott Draper & Lynn Marriner (currently in the top twelve worldwide). Since these celebrities come to town only a few times each year, Nels schedules large blocks of lesson time over a weekend: "I'm a sponge ... I can go all day long. But when I see Terri's eyes glazing over after a couple of hours, I know it's time to quit."

It was rough for Terri at first, learning a totally new body language. Then she discovered something remarkable: "Things that I was learning in Standard began connecting with things that

I was already doing in Rhythm — like foot placement and weight distribution — but now I was understanding them much more clearly. Pretty soon my Rhythm began to improve because of my work in Standard!" Nels points out "Terri is an engineer, so you can explain stuff to her in terms of geometry and mechanics, and she gets it!"

In May, they took first place in Championship Standard at the Minnesota Open. Ditto at Heart of America and Twin Cities Open. At the Big Show in August, they made it to the top twelve, a stunning victory after only eight months of training.

Keep your eye on this pair.
