



"The military men were so happy to watch us dance they didn't want us to leave." she said. The military took three of her brothers and when her father, a butcher, became ill, she and her sisters cut meat for seven years until her brothers returned from the war. She then met her husband and settled in Minneapolis, Minnesota, where she still resides today. She worked for twenty years as a book binder for Colwell Press. In 1983, she helped start the Minnesota West Coast Swing Dance Club and is blessed with lifetime membership. She has fun creating

new steps for the club and loves to teach her new ideas. "When I am on the dance floor, I forget all problems. Dance helped me to stay active both mentally and physically." She commented.

Currently, Eleanore stills enjoy swing dancing. Her warm heart and sweet natured personality is greatly appreciated by all especially the University of Minnesota and the Presbyterian Home of Arden Hills. For twenty five years she has allowed the University of Minnesota to do research using her to find cures for osteoporosis. For eleven years, she has danced with various partners at the Presbyterian Home of Arden Hills.

Dancing with the students

HITE BEAR LAKE – "Keep it small," parent Cathy Dessert coaxed as she danced the cha-cha with a Sunrise Park Middle School boy.

"Just try not to take that big step on the side and you've got it," she said as they wrapped up their lesson.

After school each Thursday, a group of about 20 middle schoolers are learning to waltz, swing and perform other ballroom dances. The after-school activity is open to all students. It's hosted by volunteer leaders and is offered free-of-charge.

Dessert, a former special education teacher who dances competitively with her husband, Bill Dessert, started the club last month. Both parents volunteer at the school in other capacities – Cathy in the English Language Learners program and Bill in the school store.

The couple, from Vadnais Heights, perform in regional and national ballroom dance competitions. They usually make it to the finals, but have never won, which is just fine, Cathy said, as they dance just for fun.

"We're not as hard core as some," she said. Their goal is simply to improve a little each competition.

Bill has work in the afternoons, so Cathy recruited friend Gary Stroick to help her lead the Sunrise class. Stroick, of St. Louis Park, is a 15-time national ballroom dance champion with his wife (they're now retired from competition) and a former vice president of a national ballroom dance organization. Friend and dancer Anna Evans also helped out last week because Cathy was recovering from an injury.

Dessert said she was worried initially whether students would sign up. Her son wasn't interested – he spends his Thursday afternoons in the History Day club. To Dessert's pleasant surprise, the group averages approximately 20 participants each week.

Eighth-grader Jon Nilon said he signed up "because it's good exercise" and "because us boys have to learn how to do it sooner or later."

His favorite dance thus far was the waltz because he got to turn and travel around the room, he said. The hardest was the cha-cha, he said.

The pupils took a break midway through their cha-cha lesson last week to discuss the club's future. They decided to try the hustle next week and decided they want to keep meeting weekly after the holiday break.

The students still are mulling over Dessert's suggestion of trying out for the upcoming school talent show and/or

participating in the Star of the North regional USA Dance competition in February.

"It's a really great confidence builder," Dessert encouraged when a few students expressed fear of performing for an audience. "You're on stage with a whole bunch of people. It's really not so scary."

But Dessert emphasized there is no pressure for the youths to perform. Dessert said her goal with the club simply is to help the students "learn a little something about the art of dance, as well as have some fun."

2009 IDSF World Latin Championships

inety-Six couples from 51 countries and 4 continents took the floor for the first round of the 2009 IDSF World Latin DanceSport Championship in Maribor Slovenia.


The top two couples from each country are allowed to represent at World Championships. The first few rounds showed many talented dancers in various stages of development. Some of the couples are hindered by choreography that focuses on tricks rather than high quality dancing. When tricks aren't done well they detract from, rather than enhance a dance.

In the early rounds there was also a tendency for the males to overshadow the females both in choreography and energy level. Because of this many of the ladies are being overpowered by the men and are unable to produce the beautiful foot, ankle and leg usage that we appreciate in a top lady dancer.

As the rounds progressed we saw greater ease of movement, more clarity and specificity in timing and musicality, and in many cases, engaging performances.

The evening festivities which were televised, included a brief presentation from the mayor of Maribor, the WRRC World Cup Boogie Woogie title events, a wheelchair formation team performance, and a very high quality solo demonstration of wheelchair latin dancing by Maxim Sedakov and Svetlana Kukushkina. There were also a number of well-produced demonstrations in standard, Latin and tango.

Dancers from only nine countries comprised the top 12. There was one couple each from Croatia, Austria, Denmark, France, the USA, and Slovenia. There were two couples each from Italy, Germany and Russia.



One surprise in this semi was that Blackpool finalists, Neil Jones and Ekaterina Sokolova from England were left out of the semi. Ultimately they placed 13th at this event. Neil is an incredibly natural and engaging dancer and his style is so different from Ekaterina's more formidable approach that they aren't convincing as a couple. With that said, there was talk around the event of

feelings that the British judges at Blackpool favor their own couples – or couples that take a month of lessons in England and that this was some sort of misplaced payback.

Russian Champions Alexey Silde and Anna Firstova were favored to win the IDSF World Latin Championships and win they did. Their powerful style filled with clean shapes and exciting rhythmical variations overshadowed competitors with more subtle strengths. I saw them as having the most unique style on the floor but would love more interpersonal relationship and warmth from this amazing couple – especially in Rumba.

With that said, I was very surprised to see the variation in marks that Alexey and Anna received – all the way from 1st to 6th. Given the couples in this final it is hard to imagine the winners being placed lower than 4th as the top four were of an extraordinary caliber. Surprisingly, Ton Greten from the Netherlands placed Alexey and Anna 6th in three dances and 5th in the remaining two. His first place couple in four of five dances was the Danish couple who placed fifth overall.

The second place couple, Croations Zoran Plohl and Tatsiana Lahvinovich (formerly dancing for Slovenia) performed very well showing excellent synchronization, good visualization of the music through body rhythms, great use of each others weight, and overall dynamic dancing. Their cha cha was especially good in the final. Interestingly, they received marks from 1st through 4th place.

Andrey Zaytsev and Anna Kuzminskaya from Russia came in third and I thought they could have been higher. I loved their dancing all day. All of their dances portray well thought out characterizations and that special something that is intangible in a partnership – and that is relationship. Their rumba is especially lovely as it explores attraction and passion between a man and a woman in a genuine, believable way. In so many rumbas danced today it seemed like one partner was in love with themself instead of the other person. Andrey and Anna were especially adept at creating feelings with their dancing – not just producing a braveura or sportsmanlike performance.

Juri Batagelj and Jagoda Strukelj from Slovenia were the audience favorites. There were signs, flags, horns, and plenty of spectators to cheer them on. My notes from the first round read, "If this couple dances like this all day, they could win." In the early rounds they gave it all they had and produced some remarkable dancing. By the final too much expression came out through their faces and heart – but they were using much less expression through their

bodies than they had been earlier. They did a lot of great dancing today – unfortunately for this incredible couple the final was not their best round of the day.

Fifth place was captured by Martino Zanibellato and Michelle Abildtrup from Denmark. They danced well all day and attracted my attention from the first round. I like their classic male/female portrayal and the fact that Michelle is highlighted in their choreography. It would be great if she can continue to show her femininity through more use of her back.

Gabriele and Antoanella Goffredo from Italy surprised me a bit by making this final. Earlier in the day they stood out with some attractive musicality and movement across the floor, but technically there are some weaknesses – especially the ladies feet.

Both Sergey and Viktoria Tatarenko from Germany and Valentin Chemerkovsky and Darla Chesnokova from the USA who placed 7th and 8th respectively were worthy of being in this final.

Overall this was an extremely well run event with a gracious organizer in Drago Sulek and an expert Chairman of Judges, Heinz Spaeker. We could feel the pride in Maribor and congratulations are due to the marvelous team that organized this World Championship.

ASK DR. DANCE

Paul Botes and Donna Edelstein are popular coaches and judges. Donna Edelstein is organizer of The Snow Ball DanceSport competition and is owner of Classic Ballroom. Paul Botes is owner of American Classic Ballroom.

My wife and I have competed in Standard for years. It seems that every coach we work with has a different idea of the "correct" position for the lady's head and devotes part of our lesson time to this subject. My wife is getting confused. What can we do?

He Said:

If something feels wrong or weird, chances are it looks weird also. First find the truth of the position, in other words, head leftward without straining while standing upright. Depending on whether you believe in a high or lower connection, the head position can be made bigger or smaller by lifting the sternum. Experimenting with this will give

you a range of motion to play with. Remember that while two plus two equals four, it is also true that by adding one to three it is possible to arrive at the same answer. There is more than one way to achieve the correct result.



She Said:

It can be very confusing to work with a lot of coaches. Many students don't realize there are different styles of standard dancing, each with their own set of beliefs and technique. Many years ago, I attended a lecture by former Australian Standard Champion Kerry Wilson. He felt that the secret to his success was having one main

teacher who guided their progress as a couple. When Paul and I were competing, we had a few main coaches with complimentary teaching techniques. As you become more experienced, you will be able to choose teachers that most resonate with you. Everyone has their own ideas and ways of expressing them. Nobody is right for everyone. My advice is to pick the one coach your wife understands the best – and work only with that coach until your wife is confident in creating her posture. Hint: the head position is related to the way a lady dancer creates her posture and balance within the partnership – and is not an isolated element. Hope this helps.

ast month I wrote about how I finally have begun to experience transcendence during a dance where I had "that" feeling of being one with my partner. This month, I'm more interested in what my partner experiences.

During the dances Fran and I have each day at home, the patterns change but the transitions are so continuous that the whole dance seemed like one unending pattern.

Do I share a family secret? Fran says, "I can follow you. It thrills me that we can dance at home, on bare feet on our new tile floor. I'm very proud of us. I close my eyes and float."

A year ago at the first USA Dance Alliance Dance, I danced with three ladies during the waterfall or mixing time. I remember commenting that each of the ladies followed quite well but seemed soft, almost invisible. Were these ladies feeling the dance without my knowing they had "that" feeling because I didn't have "that" feeling myself? I suspected so and we planned to tested it out.


This year, we attended the USA Dance Alliance dance with the intention that both of us would explore this concept of "that" feeling while we dance with each other and with others. As it turned out, there was no waterfall. I danced mostly with Fran. On the way home, we talked. She said, "How nice it is to be dancing with you. Quite often I feel you are trying to trick me, not repeating the same patterns in the same order. I really like that."

Then we compared my learning curve as a leader with Fran's progress as a follower.

Fran said, "When I dance with Harry, I dance better than I thought I could, definitely. He pushes me to do more. I don't know if I would have that same feeling if I had not had early ballroom dancing and occasional good dancers from time to time. Back in my 20s, I just flowed with my instructor. Dancing with a person that knows what he is doing is a heavenly moment."

Then the bad news came. Fran added, "All I wanted was to dance and I didn't think it would take you forever to learn. Too bad you didn't learn when you were young."

I pointed out that I had been dancing for just over two and a half years and



In order for us to have the feeling of transcendence, I have to lead the patterns with confidence, and skill. For example, we have not worked on the west coast swing. Fran can dance that dance with Harry and others who know the dance, and she feels "that" feeling. But not with me. I can't lead it well enough even if I try to dance it with Monica because I don't know how. Guess what the lessons will focus on after the Snow Ball?
