

## TODAY: COON RAPIDS TOMORROW: BROADWAY!

As Dan and Yvonne Viehman watched the first dress rehearsal for Dancin' Around the World, the 90-minute song & dance extravaganza they had conceived, written, and produced, one thought kept passing through their minds: "What have we gotten ourselves into?!? Many people had arrived late. Others were leaving early. Most did not bring costumes. Few could remember the choreography from last week's rehearsal. And no one seemed to have a clear idea how the whole thing was supposed to fit together. After plodding through three hours of questions, suggestions, changes, and doubts, even Dan and Yvonne were unsure how or if this would really work. Every theatrical production has its problems. Most, however, are not planned, assembled, and performed in a mere six weeks.

In late March Dan and Yvonne got an invitation from Tom Valach, director of the Anoka-Ramsey Community College Theatre Department, to produce a splashy dance show for culture-hungry suburbanites. This was a golden opportunity. At ten bucks a head, an auditorium that seats 350 people could generate some much-needed cash for that lovely dance floor USABDA-MN wants to buy. Even beyond the practical benefits, the chance to put on a show in a real-live theatre, equipped with lights, sound, scenery, costumes, and even a fog machine, was not to be missed.

We needed a theme to tie the whole show together," explains Dan, "but we didn't want to just do another Dancing Through The Ages. We wanted something new and exciting." So they cooked up the idea of a transcontinental airliner (the Quickstep Harrier 797) that would take the audience from one dance scenario to another: a tango in Buenos Aires, a foxtrot in New York, a two-step in Dallas, a Viennese waltz in... well, you get the idea. It was a good scheme. In fact, it was almost too good. "We were getting more ideas than we could handle," says Yvonne. "The program started growing too fast, and we were constantly struggling to contain it and keep it manageable." the show was scheduled for Friday, June 5, just nine weeks away.

Dan and Yvonne started by announcing their plan at the April USABDA board meeting. They handed out flyers at the April dance party, and recruited performers and crew at the Tea Dance. Only five weeks left now.

What format should they use? Carol Post-Stroick suggested a glitzy hustle/mambo group number to open the show. A Grease-style rock & roll number sounded like a perfect finale. And in the middle, a non-stop procession of smaller acts. Now all they needed was a ton of choreo-

graphy. Off they flew to the video store to rent Grease, Saturday Night Fever, Dirty Dancing, Boogie Nights, and a zillion other dance flicks. They picked the moves they liked best and began crafting the opener and the finale. "It was like an enormous jigsaw puzzle that was so big it seemed impossible," says Dan." So we just broke it down into small sections and worked on them one at a time." Piece by piece the puzzle began to take shape. Dan remembers waking up many mornings around 6;00 am to the sounds of Yvonne puttering through choreography in the living room. Yvonne and Carol tried out routines while Dan watched. Then Dan paced through routines while Yvonne pounded out detailed descriptions on the computer: "Step right and roll hands right, toe-dig w/left foot."

By the first rehearsal on Wednesday, May 20, they had assembled an awesome array of handouts: an itemized program of performers, music, and stage directions; detailed lists of dance moves for the opening and closing numbers; practice tapes; theatre rules ("The theatre is a very dangerous place for small children."); a list of Dancer Do's and Don'ts ("Please do not cancel unless you are dead."); and road maps of the Coon Rapids hinterland. That first rehearsal went reasonably well. The chaotic dress rehearsal a week later was bad news. Very bad. Another dress rehearsal was scheduled for the following Wednesday. Eight days left now.

The Viehman Machine kicked into overdrive. They trimmed and streamlined the program. They fired off press releases to every TV station and newspaper in town. The day of the show they gave a live interview on the local cable channel at 6:30 am(l). They cried, they cursed, they howled. Happily, the final rehearsal came and went without mishap.


On Friday, June 5, at 7:30 pm, Dan and Yvonne stepped out onto the stage, smiled into the blinding spotlights, and introduced the show to an audience they could not see. Behind the curtain, the cast of the hustle/mambo number were doing a silent pep rally. Then the music exploded into the air, the lights fired up, the curtain rose, and a host of veteran USABDA hoofers launched into a "Disco Inferno" number that would make John Travolta weep with joy. Hours later, at the cast party, the videotape was scrutinized, and the show was declared a winner. The final statistics: 225 tickets sold, and just over \$1,000 profit netted.

Dan and Yvonne give credit for the show's success to the expertise and professionalism of the cast and crew (you all know who you are), and will be seeking venues for repeat performances in the near future. So dust off that little rumba routine, call your agent, and book yourself a seat on the Quickstep Harrier!



Above : A Group Shot following the performance.





#### DORIS PEASE: LOCAL HERO

Ballroom dancers in this country owe a lot to Don's Pease. Since 1973 she has generated and cultivated many of our most treasured institutions.

In 1973, on behalf of the Minnesota Ballroom Operators association, she started Entertainment Bits, the first-of-its-kind quarterly newsletter to promote social dancing around the U.S.

In 1983, she and her daughters, LeAnn Bamford (Publisher) and Patti Johnson (Designer and Editor), started Dancing U.S. 4 a bi-monthly mag-

azine devoted to the history, instruction, and enjoyment of ballroom. Their company, DOT Publications, prints 20,000 copies of each issue, which makes *Dancing U.S.A.* the most widely circulated ballroom dance magazine in the country.

In 1990, together with Cay Cannon of Dance Action International and Bob Meyer & Joan Adams of Amateur Dancer, she spearheaded the movement to establish National Ballroom Dance week.

In that same year, she began working with the Minnesota Amateur Sports Commission to include ballroom dance in the Star of the North State Games. The first S.O.N. dance competition was held three years later at the Bel Rae Ballroom. At the end of that year, she organized the first meeting of the Minnesota chapter of the United States Amateur Ballroom Dance Association.

Most recently, Doris organized free dance classes at the Mall of America on Wednesday mornings, 10:00 -11:00, in Camp Snoopy's Playhouse.

If Doris were a scientist, she would have earned a Nobel prize by now. Instead, she and her magazine have been awarded a spot in the World Dancing Hall of Fame by the International Dance Teachers Association. Doris and five other winners from around the world will be officially recognized at the IDTA Dance congress in Blackpool this July.

Doris has the right to be pretty cocky about all this. But she talks about her achievements with the self-effacing air of someone who is being honored for doing something she thoroughly enjoys. "I've always loved journalism and dancing," she says, "and I feel so lucky to be able to make my living from both."



It has been an exciting career. The photographs, plaques, proclamations, and awards on the walls of her office will tell you that. Over the years Doris has schmoozed with more dance pros, bandleaders, ballroom operators, and politicians than any of us can name. She has served as executive secretary of the National Ballroom and Entertainment Association, and executive director of the Minnesota Ballroom Operators Association. She has been an honored guest reporter at dance celebrations all around the fifty states and Canada, and has run a couple of big band dance cruises. She has covered everything from a polka festival in Alaska to a dance weekend at the Grand Hotel on Mackinac Island to the Whoopie John Band's trip to Germany.

As Senior Editor of Dancing U.S.A., Doris' challenge is not finding material. The hard part is choosing what to print. In addition to a select crew of writers, many friends and colleagues in the dance world are eager to have their essays and reports published. "We have to decide which articles we're going to include in each issue," Doris explains, "and which ones we want to save for future issues." Dancing U.S.A has always been devoted to social dancing, and simply doesn't have room for competition results: "There's so much going on in the competition world — we couldn't possibly cover it all!" Recently, however, new departments have been added, such as Dancesport Expose and Speaking Of, that cover the competition scene.



But I'm sure something could be worked out... I'm glad to see so many high school and college students going to dances." 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#### ADVICE FROM THE PROS

Time Management for Dancers by Jennifer Foster

For most of us dance addicts, there never seems to be enough time to dance. We find dancing preoccupies most of our thoughts when we should be concentrating on something else, like work. We look for ways to fill as much of our week with dance related activities such as lessons, competitions, dances and practicing. The next thing you know, you have a whole new set of friends your "dance" friends. Or, for marrieds, a little jealousy from the spouse has reared its ugly head. Maybe you've even committed to writing articles for dance magazines...

I started dancing (ballet) when I was 12, so, at a tender age, I was already gripped by the constant drama of Swan Lake-ing all over the house. After I got into ballroom it was the same thing all over again only this time I tangoed across the kitchen and rhumba-ed in the bathroom (in front of the mirror, so I could check out my Cuban motion.) When I shopped, I only tried on clothes that could be approved as "danceable". When I heard music on the radio, I was busy figuring out whether it was a swing or a hustle. Ballroom dancing made me feel so alive! I was hooked!

Eventually, you start to realize that, like any hobby, it can cost a lot of moola to dance as much as the dance addict needs to dance. Those costumes and coachings start adding up to the point where you're ashamed to admit to a non-dancer what you've invested in your pet project. Or, you may have hit a plateau in your learning. This can be really frustrating as it spurs on the desire to take more lessons, which of course only costs more money. Before you know it your love for dancing has turned sour. Here are a few words of advice for the dance addict (it takes one to know one) to help the love you have for dancing last a lifetime.



- 1. Start looking at what you can afford monthly. If you haven't got a budget, I highly recommend you make one. If you've been dancing for a while, don't forget an allotment for things like shoes, costumes, and travel expenses.
- 2. Look for a practice partner. But don't be too picky here. Everyone needs practice, even if you're better than your partner. If this seems like too much of a commitment, have more than one partner. Teachers learn from teaching a variety of students --- this concept could help you too.
- 3. Set up a weekly schedule for dancing and stick to it! If you are trying to get ready to compete and you miss a practice, you really can't make up the time. As most of you have realized by now, one can never really make up time. Have the broad perspective that you're doing the best you can and there will always be more chances to improve your dancing.
- 4. Don't put your faith in too many instructors, especially if they are putting down one to build up another. Instead, build a good relationship with one or two pros. Most teachers can do a couple of styles well. This is all one can really do at one time anyway. Going from teacher to teacher only slows your progress. In the long run, the work will always come from you.
- 5. Finally, have fun! Dancing isn't more important than your family or work, but rather, a reward. Don't overspend or over budget your time. Keep it in perspective and it will keep rewarding you for a long time to come. Your addiction will not overwhelm you, but enhance you with greater mental and physical health.
