**Call to order:** Quorum established. Agenda approved with the addition of Paul Stachour, dance outreach. April minutes approved.

Their great music selections inspire dancers to swirl and swing around the spacious and sparkling ballroom with the greatest of form and finesse. It is magical to sit outside the ballroom at the reception table watching this artistic blending of happy faces, colorful attire, and dancing bodies moving in time to the magnificent music. The expertise and mastery of the seasoned and well practiced dancers provide role modeling for the newest members of the dance community. They have performed in many Minnesota, Wisconsin, and Ohio competitions, consistently receiving First Place awards. The highlight was being featured in the evening show at the Ohio Star Ball in 1997. This is a very busy team. Besides working very hard coaching and practicing, they have 15 children and 19 grandchildren. They feel fortunate to be coached by Deanne Michaels and Scott Anderson who also do their choreography. They danced their newest piece, a waltz to Silenzio Dolce (Sweet Silence). It was lovely.

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# Annual Tea Dance

### A Dream Come True... Submitted by Jack Munday

ancers in the Twin Cities may have to wait like everyone else for the first robin of spring. But we have our own special way to welcome spring. We dress up and enjoy the USA Dance Minnesota Tea Dance and Brunch.

This annual event is held at the Lafayette Club on Lake Minnetonka. It is a special place. On July 4th, 1882, James J. Hill opened the Hotel Lafayette, on the peninsula which is the highest point on the Lake, between Crystal Bay and Lafayette Bay, then called Holmes Bay. Its hallways were ten feet wide; there were three grand stairways; the hotel had 300 guest rooms; the building was 750 feet long by 90 feet wide. A fire destroyed that structure in 1897, and another wooden clubhouse burned in 1922. The club dedicated the present elegant stone clubhouse in 1925.

The delicious brunch is given extra spice by the tables on the terrace. We looked out over the bay and a golf fairway. Birds danced in the bushes as spring tried to arrive. Names of dancers and instructors came up, as did different studios and ballrooms. Our friends talked of the past as well as of their plans for the future. Those who compete lit up we when asked if they like competition.

Two years ago, at our first Tea Dance, Fran and I had a revelation, even an epiphany, during the dancing. We were on the ballroom floor as often as we could get up the nerve to dance. In a few weeks we would be dancing a cha cha at a granddaughter's wedding, and we practiced that on the floor to every cha cha and every rumba they played. We tried a waltz and a fox trot, but I quit almost immediately.

Experienced dancers were flying around the floor, some coming close to the chairs where we were sitting. The progressive dances that move around the floor present their own special challenge and I wasn't up to leading that well. I had been dancing for about one year, and this dance showed me just how far I had to go to help Fran realize her dream, of having a dancing partner.

Late in the afternoon, Fran and I were standing on the outside of the dance floor and a woman next to me asked me if I wanted to dance to a particular song the DJ announced. I said I didn't know how to do that dance. "I don't either but I was just going to follow your lead." Now that was a challenge.

This year we belonged. We sat with good friends, some of whom are on the Cheek To Cheek smooth formation team as I am. We all talked about our plans to dance, compared studios, and of course affirmed the Tea Dance as the highlight of the year.

During the dancing, several times Fran and I reminded the other of how far we had come, no longer intimidated by the other dancers. At this point in my dancing, I have been focusing on learning technique rather than so many patterns. I perform at the bronze level and I was reminded of my instructor, Monica Mohn's comment that "a properly done bronze routine can be very beautiful." Virtually every dance was smooth, filled with "that" feeling that I write about from time to time.

The Tea Dance is the highlight of our dancing year because we enjoy the ambiance, friendship, large floor, great selections of music, and just being there. On the way home, Fran said, "Your dancing, and your leading me, has made my dream come true."



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

### MY, HOW WE'VE GROWN! By Greg Moore

he Minnesota Dancing Times has evolved into a national marketing medium.

When Janis and I agreed to run the newsletter for the United States Amateur Ballroom Dance Association (USABDA as it was known then) we did not make the decision lightly. The Minnesota Dancing Times was an essential communication tool for the local studios, dance instructors, and dancers. In its pages you found out where to take lessons, where to buy costumes and accessories, and where to put all that new learning and gear to the test. There would be a lot of advertisers and dancers out there counting on us to get that newsletter out on time every month. It was a very big job.

We both wanted the newsletter to be something more than just a bulletin board and, under the watchful (and sometimes apprehensive) gaze of the Board of Directors, we introduced several radical changes. As someone whose overdeveloped right brain has bullied his left brain into total submission, I didn't give a hoot about advertising. I just wanted the newsletter to look fabulous. Fortunately, Janis has always been the mature, responsible member of this partnership. She understood that, for an all-volunteer organization like ours, it is the advertisers who make any publication possible. And, if a newsletter attracts readers, it will also attract advertisers.

The hard working people who have taken charge of the newsletter since then have held true to this guiding principle. Every subtle innovation in content or appearance has been made with one goal in mind: to keep the readers wanting more.

In 2003 the newsletter's reach was increased when the ballroom theme was broadened to include partner dancing in general. Then the Dancing Times was launched into cyberspace and our readership expanded exponentially. Printing costs used to limit us to a black-and-white production. Now readers can enjoy the splendor of ballroom dancing in living color.

Janis and I could count on our newsletter being read by about one hundred USABDA-MN members. Today that number has multiplied by a factor of twenty, including vendors, private coaches, dance clubs, and competition organizers. Many USA Dance chapters have asked us how they might produce something like the Dancing Times.

Of course, many old fashioned readers (like myself) prefer the printed page to an electronic screen whose insidious electronic rays scramble your brain. And so, each month we print an average of eight hundred copies. Approximately three hundred are mailed out and the rest are distributed (free of charge) to studios around the Twin Cities.

Each month the newsletter staff contributes a collective total of more than a hundred hours to publish the Dancing Times, which helps to keep the subscription and advertising rates low. Ten years ago, the newsletter was a line item expense on the USABDA annual budget. Today the newsletter supports itself.



# ASK DR. DANCE

Donna Edelstein is a popular coach, judge and organizer of the Snow Ball DanceSport Competition. Paul Botes is owner of American Classic Ballroom.



My dance instructor spends most of our lesson time talking. I would like to spend most of that time dancing, but I'm still new to ballroom and I'm not sure if I should raise the issue. Should I mention this or just be patient?



#### **Answer:**

Is your teacher talking about dance technique like posture, frame, footwork, or other elements of movement? If so, your teacher is actually teaching, not just talking. If your teacher is 'shooting the breeze' then you should mention that learning is your priority and you'd like to stay more focused on the lesson.

Some studios and independent teachers view themselves as 'social clubs' and getting to know the students and build rapport is what they are all about. Other studios and independent teachers are more focused on the students progress and understanding of key concepts. You may have found a chatty teacher when what you really want is a teacher who is more about the dancing.

Conversely, I have seen students, especially ladies with male teachers who want to 'be danced'. Rather than wanting to learn how to become an equal member of the partnership they just want the good feeling that comes from having an experienced partner dance them around the floor. This can be very hard on the teacher's body, and they don't really feel like they are teaching or giving value for dollar.

The best scenario is where what the teacher has to offer and what the student wants to receive are in sync. There are some wonderful teachers in the Twin Cities area. Make sure that you find the one that is right for you. Good luck!

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### **Gentlemen Lead**

Recently Fran and I arranged for a dance lesson at the church where we are members, Our Saviour's Lutheran Church in East Bethel. The music program at the church is wonderful, and includes a gentleman who has his own band. The Doctor Bellows band plays rock and blues music at clubs in the area and has a following of congregation members and other fans.

Our reason for arranging the lesson was so that we could meet others in the congregation who like to dance. I tried to help them get the basic footwork and encourage them to have fun. We danced in the narthex of the church and others who were using the building came past us with huge smiles. At times the laughter and shouts of happiness almost drowned out our instructor. The day before, on Sunday at worship, the opening hymn had this for a first line. "May your home be filled with dancing." That certainly proved to be true at the church.

One of the topics I like to include in this column is my reaction and feelings about my dancing experiences. At the lesson, I found myself dancing with ladies who had not yet learned the basic patterns in these dances. I thought back to when I began learning to dance. It is a testimony as to



how much I have learned about dancing that I could help others, counting out the slows and quicks, forwards, sides and backs for the ladies while keeping myself on the beat.

How well did the teaching work? Our class had a field trip. On Saturday night we went to a country club to dance to Dr. Bellows and his band. Ten of the class and five other friends sat at tables we pulled together. When the music started, Fran and I danced some of the basic patterns, as a refresher demonstration. We were joined by others and had a nice time. Good music, good friends, dancing.
