Critiquing my 'Dancing with the Stars' Costume Critiques!

Why do I post my costume critiques from 'Dancing with the Stars'? Well, I love watching dance performances, especially when the performers are all decked out in fabulous, custom designed costumes! Don't you?

"One of my missions in life, is to make the world a more beautiful place – with appropriately designed and fitting costumes!"

I have been creating clothing and costumes professionally (if getting paid by a friend counts!) for 5 decades now (with 4 decades as the head designer for my company, Satin Stitches Ltd. and several years in 'the business' after my college years with my Fashion Design classes). With a profound interest in fashion design since my youth, I have continued to critique clothing on those around me, what's in the movies and on television, in Broadway shows and Miss America pageants, AND on 'Dancing with the Stars'.

Back in the day when I rode our metro transit system to my downtown Minneapolis job, I would note the seaming and darts (patternmaking and construction techniques) used on my fellow passengers' apparel, along with noting color combinations, fit details and of course styling choices. I've always preferred shiny and glitzy, so of course it's even better to critique shiny and glitzy costumes over our 'plain Jane' every day, street apparel. (Yes, I personally wear 'plain Jane, every day, street apparel, too! – It just generally doesn't excite me like fancy costumes.)

So yes, I have 'stars in my eyes' when I'm watching all the dancers (and hosts and judges and audience members) on DWTS. Yes, I love the dance performances, but I love the costuming more! And if I get to share some of my observations, whether they are 'personal opinions' or design/artistic 'rules' that everyone should be aware of, then even better. If I am able to dissuade even one person from buying and wearing an outfit that they just wouldn't look good in, I will rejoice. One of my missions in life, is to make the world a more beautiful place – with appropriately designed and fitting costumes!

I also try to educate and to note when a particular costume would be flattering for nearly all, or only 'work' on that perfectly proportioned dancer that is wearing it. I mention when a costume would be a good 'basic' costume for an amateur dancer (and therefore cost effective) or if it would be only for those with deep pockets


where money spent on one specifically themed costume may not be the best idea as an investment, even though it was a spectacular costume.

With my knowledge and expertise, I understand how garments can easily be altered to fit, or to realize when a custom fitted costume would be difficult to alter, when selling this costume to another, or if the wearer loses or gains weight. All things to consider when you are buying or creating a new (or 'previously worn') dance costume.

And sometimes I just like to admire a dancer/costume combo because it warms my heart with its beauty. One of my 'mantras' is that ANY costume or garment will look classier and more expensive and pleasing, if it FITS properly. And vice versa, ANY costume or garment, no matter how expensive, can look dumpy, if it doesn't fit right. The moral of this story...invest in professional alterations to class up your wardrobe, whether with a simple, inexpensive garment or something extravagant. And if you would like my professional advice, call me!

I also enjoy writing and sharing my thoughts and knowledge. I hope that at least some of my 'Dancing with the Stars' Costume Critique fans enjoy my musings! And just be calm...it is only a popularity contest after all. The best dancer does NOT always win the mirror ball!





2018 Wisconsin State DanceSport Championships

"And placing first in all dances"

Well, let me just say right up front, it wasn't us. Ed and I placed 4th of four couples in the Open Amateur Smooth Championship at the Wisconsin State DanceSport Championships, April 24-28. But in my mind, we were still winners for dancing in front of a big crowd on a Friday night. We danced well and so we felt like champions.

The level of skill at this competition was incredible! For example, we saw an amateur couple we know who usually dance at the Championship (top) level at Amateur competitions, competing at a *pre-silver* level (a much more basic level) in the Pro/Am heats. They didn't do nearly as well as we would have expected. This is not to diminish the skill level of our amateur dancers, but rather to emphasize the talent at this particular competition.

The WSDC is a Pro/Am ballroom dance competition, which means that amateur students dance with their professional teachers. They compete against one another in varying age groups, dance styles, and difficulty levels. Many Pro/Am competitions also have Am/Am events, where two amateurs can dance together, competing against other

amateurs. That's how Ed and I ended up in the Open Smooth Championship: two amateurs dancing with each other.

One of our dance goals this year is to compete in a ballroom dance competition each month. WSDC fit the April timeframe nicely. We've been competing at amateur competitions for several years and we hadn't danced at a pro/am competition in a long time. It was so much fun, watching and cheering our ballroom friends and co-competitors - and dancing dozens of heats over a three-day period, with each other and with our professional teachers, Scott Anderson and Natalie Botes.

We've learned that dancing well at a ballroom competition is different than just dancing well. In our case, competition dancing helps us to improve floor-craft, practice warming-up properly for that all important first heat, and learning ways to calm performance nerves. The only way to get better at something is to practice, thus the decision to 'practice' competing monthly. Previously, we competed once or twice per year and we felt it wasn't enough.

The Wisconsin State Dance Competition draws many Minnesota competitors. At one point, during a Gentlemen's International Standard multi-dance, Minnesota dominated the floor with Michelle Hudson (Cinema Ballroom) and Scott Skinner; Neli Petkova (Dancers Studio) and John Burns; and Natalie Botes (American Classic Ballroom) and Ed Soltis.

The WSDC was held at the elegant Pfister Hotel in Milwaukee; first-time organizers Martin Cawston and Justin Deehr were gracious hosts from start to finish. We loved the hospitality and ease with which they helped minimize the confusion of registration and check-in. Every detail was noticed and appreciated.

The professional heats were incredible to watch; it was particularly fun to see Scott's daughter Meghan Anderson and her fiancée Igor Afonkin win the American Professional Smooth Rising Star category and place 3rd in the Open Professional Smooth heats.

Lastly, our pros Scott Anderson and Natalie Botes were a delight to work with. Congratulations, Scott, on winning a Top Teacher Award and the Top Small Studio Award, for your studio Twin City DanceSport!



USA Dance-Minnesota Hosts New Friday Monthly Dances

Have you been to the USA Dance-Minnesota Friday night Tapestry dance yet? If you haven't, you're missing out because it's a great time, held on the second Friday of each month. June's dance will be June 8th so mark your calendars.

It all started when Donna Francisco asked our USA Dance-Minnesota President Lee Whitney to deejay her first and third Sunday night ballroom dances at Tapestry. He did so in January and again in July. These Sunday nights were very well attended.

The Tapestry Board and Dana, their Executive Director, wanted to add another ballroom event to their monthly calendar. They approached Donna, their contact person in the ballroom world, who asked Lee to co-host this event. Lee discussed this with USA Dance-Minnesota Board and everyone agreed to give this a try. USA Dance-Minnesota signed a six-month contract with Tapestry in January 2018.

The dances are held the second Friday of each month, the lesson is 7-8 pm and the dance is from 8-11 pm. I think I've been to every one of them and they are wonderful! I've always had such a great time and I love dancing on the the large Tapestry floor.

Lee provides the music and different instructors provide the lesson. Each month they have the same dance style that is taught at Project Dance, and they

feature this same dance style at the third Saturday monthly dance as well.

They wanted to keep the costs reasonable because there are other events going on at that time, so Tapestry and USA Dance members can attend for \$8 and non-members are \$10. There have been a consistent 40-50 people attending and Lee is getting strong feedback from the dancers that they like the event. The dances are cohosted by two non-profit organizations and after paying the dance instructor, the entry fee is split between Tapestry and USA Dance-Minnesota. The chapter has been averaging \$150 a month and this money is used to pay for other events like the Sunday afternoon Project Dance.

Lee plans to encourage the USA Dance-Minnesota Board to renew a new contract for the remainder of the year. He's been very pleased with the first five months and likes the mix between the USA Dance and Tapestry members. He thinks these dances are an opportunity to bring new members into the USA Dance-Minnesota Chapter. Currently, the chapter has 260

members, which is more than double since 2013 when the club averaged 120-130 members. Lee is hoping for good steady growth to eventually have around 300-350 members.

There are a lot of reasons to be a member of USA Dance-Minnesota: Sunday Project Dance, the third Saturday monthly dance, and now the Friday night dance. There are also special events like the annual Tea Dance and the Dance Camp held this year in February.

The mission of USA Dance-Minnesota is to increase the quantity and quality of ballroom dance.



The Three Worlds of Ballroom Dance

Social, competition, and exhibition ballroom dance are all united by a love of partnered dance. All three forms are enjoyed by their fans for good reasons. They share similar steps, vocabulary, and music. But it's helpful to know how they differ from each other.

The essential difference between the three is that they have different audiences.

Then looking closer at the differences: What are your audience's expectations?

Your partners want to interact with you spontaneously, for fun, doing steps that are also enjoyable for them.

Judges want to see that the steps and styles are done precisely and correctly, with great flair.

Audiences want to be entertained, often with a preference for beautiful and impressive moves.

What is your attitude?

- Sociable, i.e., friendly, and kind.
- Flexibly adaptive. You value and accommodate to styles that are different from your own.
- Rigorously correct, expansive.
- The many styles outside of the official syllabus are usually considered to be incorrect.
- Performance attitude varies widely, depending on the dance form.

What is the attitude concerning mistakes?

- Mistakes are accepted as inevitable. Social dancers laugh them off and move on.
- When a follow does something different from what the lead intended, he knows it's a valid alternative interpretation of his lead.
- Social dancers are happy if things work out 80% of the time. The other 20% is when most learning happens.
- Judges deduct points for every mistake, so competitive dance culture is aligned against making mistakes from day one.
- When a follow does something different from what the lead intended, he considers it a mistake, which is to be eliminated.
- Competitive dancers work hard to achieve 100%.
- For professional performances, audiences expect perfection, so dance companies rehearse extensively to avoid any mistakes onstage.
- For amateur performances, the audience mostly wants to see that the dancers are enjoying themselves, so mistakes are generally accepted.

Are there standardized steps and techniques?

No, standardization doesn't function because each partner is different. You must modify your steps to adapt to each partner.

Yes, rigorously standardized, because competitors need to know exactly what technical details the judges want to see

Sometimes, but in today's sampling culture ("been there, seen that") audiences prefer something they've never seen before.

Is there a standardized style?

Absolutely not. You develop your own personal style, different from others. Some social forms like swing, tango and salsa especially discourage copying other's styles.

Yes, absolutely. You are trained to copy the style of champions before you, working hard to imitate every nuance of that standardized style.

Yes, absolutely. You are trained to copy the style of champions before you, working hard to imitate every nuance of that standardized style. Styles may be unique to the choreographer, thus not standardized. But the performing group usually works on copying and mastering that one style.

Is there a fixed choreography?

No. You make it up as you go along, often based on what the follow is doing at the moment, and what occurs to the lead spontaneously. Both lead and follow engage in a highly active attention to possibilities.

Yes. Competitors usually perform choreographed routines that they have rehearsed. An exception is Jack and Jill competitions, usually in WCS and Lindy hop, with a partner one has not danced with before.

Yes. Exhibitions are usually choreographed and rehearsed. Furthermore, group routines often have everyone dancing in unison. But improvised exhibitions do exist, especially in swing, tango and blues.

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
