

EDITOR'S INTRO

From the Editor By Greg Moore

Like most competitors, active and retired, Janis and I have a ton of photos. Hers are all neatly arranged in chronological order in several albums. Mine are still in their little developing lab envelopes in approximate chronological order in several shoeboxes. Probably the most cherished of these are from our very first Nationals, way back in 1998. And the one that fascinates us both is the snapshot that was taken just before the music began for our very first dance.

The event was Adult Silver American Smooth. We were one of the oldest couples in the event and definitely the smallest. The gentlemen were a somber looking bunch in black and white. Only a few, including myself, were in tailsuits. The ladies, on the other hand, were decked out in a stunning array of colors, fabrics, and designs, all intended to catch and hold the wandering eyes of the judges. In her gown of magenta crushed velvet and multiple chiffon skirts, Janis was the very picture of stately elegance.

So there we were, standing at attention in our chosen starting position among a dozen or so couples standing in their own starting positions, all smiling serenely at our partners and waiting breathlessly for the music meister to hit the PLAY button. "We look like a giant chess board," Janis commented when we first saw this photo. At that moment it was a purely esthetic observation. In the months and years to follow, we would discover that the chess analogy is appropriate to ballroom competition on other levels.

Of course, the differences between chess and ballroom are obvious. In chess one attempts, through an infinite variety of codified maneuvers, to place his opponent's king in an indefensible position. In ballroom there is no such engagement with the enemy. In fact, the better you are at staying away from your opponents, the better your chances of success on the dance floor.

The parallels between chess and ballroom did not become apparent to us until we entered the open levels, where the field was smaller and we began to understand which couples were the ones to beat. In addition to studying principles of dance and learning our choreography, we would also learn to study our opponents. What choreography were they were using and what could we do so that we would stand out? Which ballgown styles were the ladies wearing? And which competitions they were winning (or not)? We also made an earnest attempt to profile the judges, many of whom were regulars at the regional and national events. What were their backgrounds as competitors? What were they looking for on the dance floor? What sort of marks could we expect from this or that judge? And who were their regular students?

The challenge was to find a working balance between [1] looking like we really belonged out there with those dancers and [2] looking like something original.

After many years of this continuous analysis and speculation, we could easily understand why many dancers choose not to compete. Most variables were totally beyond our control and struggling to incorporate them all into some kind cohesive plan was enough to burn out the average human brain. It's easy to say "Just go out there and dance!" But a thorough examination of your opponents and the conditions under which you are competing is not unique to ballroom or chess. It's an essential part of most sports, especially those that operate on the basis of comparison rather than individual achievement.

As I look at that photo from our very first Nationals, our chessboard tableau reminds me of the many hours we spent trying to hammer out a strategy that would get us into the finals. But it was never all work. The smiles on our faces in that photo were genuine, not staged. We were delighted just to be there, to get all dressed up and put on our best show. In the midst of all those uncontrollable variables, that thrill was something we could always count on.

The President's Corner Focused on Serving You

Ithough the USA Dance Minnesota board has been making decisions we feel best serve you, our dance community, we have not involved you as well a good non-profit should. We want to hear from you and are planning on opening up our communication to help us know how to serve you best. Look for a survey coming soon that will give you an opportunity to express what you want from USA Dance Minnesota.

Currently, the USA Dance Minnesota board members are doing board and committee work. Work, we feel, organized committees could do better to serve our dance community. Our goal is to have committees of USA Dance volunteers running special events, monthly dances, board nominating, outreach, communication, etc., which could reach deeper into the community we serve. We have two committees with strong leadership that have been working well to serve our dance community; our Dancing Times Newsletter and Star of the North competition. When someone steps down from a committee, who will take their place?

We are also planning, starting this year, to hold an annual membership meeting. Most likely the annual meeting will be sometime in November. This membership meeting will be a place to become informed on USA Dance Minnesota activities, ask questions and express yourself. You will also have an opportunity to listen to those who want to serve on the board. It is at the annual meeting you will have an opportunity to vote for USA Dance Minnesota board membership. If you are a member and can't be present, a ballot will be sent to you.

USA Dance Minnesota is your dance chapter. What kind of dances do you like to attend or how could they be



better? How do you want to serve? What is the talent you have to bring that could make our chapter better? The current board has a lot of energy to serve you. We are very excited about our newsletter, website, Star of the North competition, monthly dances, event planning and becoming better organized. We are inviting those of you who would love this opportunity to step up and join in the fun. The more people that get involved the more fun we can have.



Scott and Amy (smooth choreography, coaches, Pro-am partner)


Peter and Yuliya (standard choreography, coaches)

Thursday was American smooth day and Cinema Ballroom had the majority of our students dancing that day. Plastic clapping toys, pom poms and miscellaneous noise makers helped but everyone kept cheering and clapping for the entire day showing great comradery and team spirit!

Friday was American rhythm day with some of the amateur and professional events that evening. Friday was the longest day of the entire weekend, starting at 7:00 am and ending at approximately 11:30 pm. Cinema Ballroom instructors, Eric and Michelle Hudson, competed in the Open Professional Showdance division. They performed their nationally known golf number which they first performed as Open World Professional American Smooth finalists at the Ohio Star Ball at the end of 2009. Despite the long day (both Eric and Michelle started the day at 7:00 am dancing with students), they won 2nd place! Congratulations on that feat are definitely on order!

Dancing Youth - Future Champions?

y day job is working with boys with autism at a middle school in Mounds View. While I spend much time on academics with my boys, my real focus is teaching socialization. After the school day is done, I work in Mounds View community education. In this position I facilitate the sporting events hosted by the middle school, sometimes even putting on a referee shirt and getting into the games. My job allows me to have a relationship with a broad spectrum of students. My hobby is ballroom dancing.


I recently had an experience where my day job and my hobby came together. The principal of the school asked Julie Blaske and me to teach ballroom dance to the 8th grade class for a week during their gym period. The principal was looking for the students to learn more than how to dance. Ballroom dance was chosen because it teaches respectful touching, respectful communication, good hygiene with exercise thrown in for good measure. The principal was required to hire substitutes to replace Julie and me while we taught dance, so the commitment by the school for this experience was high.

What we achieved went far beyond any expectations.

We spent most of the week on waltz. Julie and I rotated partners frequently so everyone danced with everyone. Some students that had probably never spoken to each other in three years found they were now in dance frame trying to navigate around the floor. At the end of the week, the students would be "checked-out" using a sheet Julie and I had prepared that included marks for posture, timing and overall appearance.

Eighth grade is an awkward period for physical development. Some kids look like the men and women they will soon become, while others still retain most of their child-like features. This resulted in many interesting "pairings" where there girl was much taller than her male lead. Also, the population of my school is very diverse, so there were pairs from very different social and ethnic backgrounds. The kids did not find any of this unusual and responded with unbridled enthusiasm. How often in this day and age does the girl get to imagine herself as the princess and the boy as the chivalrous gentleman? The students could not get enough.

The momentum ballroom dance started in the school was amazing. Teachers would share stories with Julie and me about seeing two boys rehearsing the waltz box in frame together as they were waiting in the lunch line. Students were practicing every spare minute in hallways, outside waiting for their bus and in the media center. Teachers and other staff members started showing up to watch the dance sessions and some of the younger teachers filled in as





dance partners without being asked. Students were brushing their teeth after lunch and borrowing breath mints from each other before class started.

In my normal daily routine, I start every workday by waiting outside in the bus lanes with a wheelchair as the first busses pull in. I escort a 6th grade girl with two leg prosthesis into school. On the last day of ballroom week while I was waiting for her to come off her bus, I noticed the 8th graders debarking their busses. Many were dressed to the nines for their dance checkouts! The boys had suits or shirts with ties and a large number of girls had dresses or skirts with heels. Julie and I had said nothing about dressing up. I did not even recognize most of them!

The most memorable moment came when Julie and I were judging the last period of the day. The 6th grade Phy Ed teacher came into the gym and informed us we would have to share the space with her class. Until that time we had the entire gym to ourselves. Julie and I were disappointed, but said we would make it work. As we were warming up the 8th graders, the 6th grade students asked their teacher if they could sit along the walls and watch the 8th grade dance. We decided to try it. I was apprehensive that the 6th graders would snicker and make the 8th graders self conscious. I could not have been more wrong. The younger students were absolutely captivated watching the older kids dance. As we were judging the finals pairs, the



'nited States ballroom dance competitor kids Erik Linder (9) and his dance partner Rickie Taylor (9) had the adventure of a lifetime as they travelled together with rising star team mates Nathan Murstein (10) and partner Polina Dickenson to compete against the worlds best couples in Blackpool, England. These two couples are part of Team USA that just competed at the world famous Junior Blackpool Dance Festival held in England, the largest and most coveted competition in the world. The competition has brought together young dancers for competition and fun for over 50 years.

Most kids and adults only dream of the opportunity to go Blackpool, yet these two

talented and hard working couples showed that they had the stuff champions are made off. Both Erik and Rickie as well as Nathan and Polina placed the highest any young US couple have in recent memory which is a huge achievement in a world standing.

Erik and Rickie who became national champions at the age of 7, have appeared on national television shows such as The Oprah Show as well as being Semi Finalists on NBC's "America's Got Talent" last fall.

Nathan and Polina made a fantastic debut making it to the semi final in the Cha Cha, placing an unheard of 14 out of 85, in the Jive 48 out of 83, and in Ballroom 50 from 81. In the Jive Erik and Rickie were in the quarter final finishing 21 out of 83, in British Ballroom Championship they were

29 out of 81, Cha Cha - 25 out of 85 and in the Viennese Waltz 26 out of 72. "It is fantastic to have such strong showing by American kids in a sport dominated by European countries as well as the Ukraine and Russia", says Lars Linder, Erik's dad. "These kids are on the top here in the USA, now they are showing the world that they are competitive on a international level especially when they are up against couples that are 12 years old in their division and have been to Blackpool for many years".

The US Team placed 5th in the Team Match with the win going to the Ukraine.

Jonathan Wilkins, World Champion, and winner of PBS's America's Ballroom Challenge, who resides in New York paired up with Olga Foraponova -Wright, two time Professional Champion to head up the US Team bringing four juvenile couples and four junior couples to represent the the USA. "We do all we can do to be the best", says Jonathan.

The self confidence and growth that these young athletes come away with from Blackpool is clearly evident in their return to the US. Erik and Rickie as well as Nathan and Polina flew from London just days before the London airport was shut down due to the


Icelandic Volcano fallout. The two young couples flew directly to the USA DanceSport Nationals that were held in Los Angeles, California where they competed the following morning. "I can't wait to compete", said Rickie as she reflected on her experience

in England.

For Erik and Rickie this year's Nationals would be extra challenging as they come in to it as two time defending national champions. They won the Pre Teen II Gold Standard as well as the Pre Teen II Latin making them three time National Champions. To top it off, a very special award

Gentlemen Lead

Back in the 1970s, we danced to the rhythm of the music—free style. Fran knew dance steps from her early dancing and didn't always give me the chance to lead —and I didn't know I was really supposed to lead. Many times she took command and I just followed her around the floor. It was dancing freedom, expressing how we felt when we heard the music. That is not all bad.

On May 8, 1979, so long ago, Fran and I had plans to go dancing, rock and roll, at a bar. Instead, I took Fran to the emergency room where we began a vigil for her eighteen-year-old daughter, Marlys. The details of why Marlys was in intensive care can be found in one of my books, Justice For Marlys.

The reason I'm bringing up this singular event in our lives is because, once again, dancing has had a profound effect on our lives. Last May 8, thirty years to the day, we went dancing, at a bar, reclaiming what we should have had. The dancing proved to us that we can live a very good and very different life in memory of Marlys.

When we went in the bar, our friends, Larry and Dave, were playing Tequila Sunrise. We tossed our jackets on a chair and began our rumba. A waitress came up while we danced, asked if I wanted a scotch on the rocks. I said "Yes, thank you," and Fran asked for plain water. The dance floor is small, but we are often the only ones who dance. The songs, mainly from the 1970s, take us back to those courting years and fond memories.

We took our seats at a table and waited for the next song. Dave plays the base and drives the songs nicely. That made it so easy to follow the music.

When we had an opportunity to dance to Waltz Across Texas, I led Fran in a new pattern I had just learned, where I step forward, swing in an arc to my left, then drop back. It is a cross step for the Viennese waltz and Fran followed effortlessly.

During the rumba to Third Rate Romance, Fran flirted with me, swung her hips, eyes so bright we didn't need the lights. When I led her in a turn, then drew her close to my side in a shoulder check, she caressed my cheek. Happiness flowed through the connection between us.



Late in the evening we realized that many of the rock and roll songs we danced to felt best doing the mambo steps. Even more amazing, at times our mambo transformed into a rumba or east coast swing, all in time to the beat of Dave's base.

Ballroom dancing, I have now understood, is not only about gentlemen leading and ladies following. Rather, is about a gentleman and a lady forming a partnership that moves with grace, beauty, perhaps affection or passion, but unified as one person. Together they make a picture. At the bar, we did just that.

We requested the last song of our dancing night, holding each other a bit more intimately than the formal waltz we danced to this song at a showcase. We clearly affirmed the picture we made, once again reclaiming what had been taken from us thirty years ago. We were the last patrons at the bar. Now it was time to go home.

Like everyone else, I do my job for a salary. But my job is also part calling. I get a thrill when I see my boys make friends and handle tough situations without fists or abusive language. In general, my job is pretty rewarding. But I have to admit, this experience teaching dance was the highlight of my career working with kids. It is the greatest feeling to see the smiles on their faces when they know they have done it right. Kids often remind you about what is really important in life, and they can help you see life from a different perspective. Lately I have been wondering about where I am going with my own dancing. The kids reminded me that dancing is about breaking barriers and having fun. Yup, that's why I want to dance. And who knows, maybe one of my kids will be a national champion someday!
