Partnership Profile:

NELS PETERSEN AND THERESA KIMLER

The conversation pauses for a moment. Nels Petersen and Theresa Kimler turn to look at each other. They have been asked when and how they first met, and they are searching the air between them for an answer. "We competed pro/am against each other several years ago," Nels begins, "I think you guys beat us once, didn't you?" he asks, watching for her reaction. Another pause. Theresa looks at him sweetly, raises two fingers and both eyebrows. Nels grins. "Oh was it twice?" he asks innocently. She nods, then adds, "I wasn't much of a dancer back then, just real smiley and wiggley. Maybe that's what the judges liked."

Nels must have liked it, too. In 1994 they got together for a tryout period of twenty practice hours. They then agreed to enter into a partnership. Their success since then is unparalled in the world of U.S. amateur dancing. During their first year they bagged the U.S. Amateur Rhythm Championship, and have done so every year since then. In 1996 they became the North American Amateur Rhythm Champions, and still hold that title. In 1996 and 1997 they won the prestigious Feather Award.

Their dancing has set new standards for American amateurs. They are the ones to beat. They have become national celebrities, flying to all ends of the continent for exhibitions, seminars, TV promotions, and talk shows.

They make it look so easy. But they understand, perhaps better than most of us, the importance of hard work. "There are plenty of people out there who are more talented than we are," Nels points out. But he and Theresa have made it to the top (and stayed there) because they have stuck to a regimen that would kill the average human: a solid twenty hours of practice each week, periodic marathons with world-class coaches such as Rufus Dustin and Corky & Shirley Ballas, a couple of dozen competitions each year, and a dizzying list of public appearances ("We're very marketable.").

Planning is another element that has made them top dogs. The day after the USABDA National Championships they begin plotting their training schedule for the coming year: what they want to achieve, which coaches can help them the most, and when these coaches are available to visit the Twin Cities. Competitions are an essential part of their training, and they pick competitions where they can expect to find the most challenging opponents and the most demanding judges.

Using videotapes and photographs, they analyze their performances throughout the year, assessing every element of their dance. Like all competitive athletes, they must pace themselves carefully. A year is a long time, and their energy must be measured out in a slow, steady crescendo. For the football player, there is the Superbowl. For the cyclist, there is the Tour de France. For Nels and Theresa, it is Nationals. There they must pull out all the stops, give 110%, and dance their hearts out.


Dedication like this is typical of professional athletes, people who do it for a living. Nels and Theresa, however, are amateurs, people who do something *else* for a living, and devote their spare(?) time to their sport. When he's not dancing, Nels runs his own business. Theresa keeps herself busy during the day as a

licensed mechanical engineer. So anyone who wants their time needs to book well in advance.


What if you aspire to ballroom greatness, but you're stuck with a skimpy budget and near-zero free time? Take heart. There are ways of maximizing the benefits of your training.

First, decide how much time and money you are willing and able to spend on your dancing. Next, shop around for a coach. "Whenever I see someone spending thousands every year on training that's getting them nowhere," says Nels, "I want to grab them by the back of the neck and explain things to them ... Working with a coach is an employer/employee relationship. Most people don't understand that ... You have to learn to get what you need from your coach." Finally, focus your efforts. Work on specific problems and toward specific goals: "Even if you're only working a couple of times a year with some out-oftown coach, just tell them: 'This month we're just working on waltz,' or 'We want to fix this part of our choreography' ... Make the most of every minute."

Five Minnesota couples attended the USABDA SE Regional in Atlanta, Georgia on October 2nd and 3rd. Tom Sheehan and Elizabeth Smith started the MN action by firing up an appreciative audience. They won the Gold Rhythm Syllabus. Great dancing on Saturday put them 2nd in Pre-Championship and 3rd in Open Rhythm.

Mark Vollmer and Bonita Bartholomew, in their first all-amateur comp, also had a great weekend. Dancing International Standard they placed 2nd in Gold Syllabus Adult A and B, and Silver Syllabus Adult B. They also placed 7th in Novice Adult A, and 4th in Novice Adult B. They showed more poise than most experienced couples usually display.

James and Celeste Gibson, charged from their success at Nationals and the NE Regionals, continued their winning ways in Atlanta. Despite a scheduling error that put them on the floor cold and two hours early, they placed an impressive 5th in Open Viennese Waltz, 4th in Pre-Championship American Smooth Adult A, 4th in Championship American Smooth Adult B, and 6th in Open American Smooth.

Atlanta blessed Gary and Carol Stroick with the 24-hour flu. After winning Open American Smooth, Gary was heard to say that he was most grateful *not* for winning, but for not tossing his cookies all over Carol's gown during the Viennese. After Smooth, they pushed even harder through their illness, danced a great semi-final, and made the final in Open Standard.

Nels Petersen and Theresa Kimler won the Open American Rhythm and placed second in the Open Standard.
