

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Dancing Through the Ages

Christine Miller - Returning to Dance By Anne LaTourelle

Q. When, where and how were you introduced to dancing (as an adult, young adult, etc.)?

I may have been born dancing. I was always "jumping around" as my Father put it. I would watch dancing on television (remember Dance Fever, Solid Gold, Fame) and would go to the backyard with my boom box and try to replicate what I saw. I took my problems to the music – there was always a song that dealt with whatever challenge I was facing and with my body I could express every emotion. I dreamed of moving to NYC and dancing on Broadway, but it wasn't to be. Unfortunately, I was involved in a car accident in high school and after multiple (bad) life choices I gave up all dancing for many years.

I refocused my life on my core values with a move back to MN 3 years ago and recommitted my life to dance with my first class.

Q. What was your first ballroom dance experience like (instant attraction or did you leave and return)?

I took my first ballroom dance class at the U of MN and loved it. I wanted to take more classes at that time, but couldn't afford to take more in a studio. If only I had known then that I could have trained from the start to be a teacher... Now there is a fantastic U of MN Ballroom Dance club to support people like me.



Q. What motivated you to keep going?

My life is most full and complete when I am dancing. The day just doesn't feel right if I am not dancing.

In the last 3 years I have lost at least 30 pounds and am working towards being in the best shape of my life. I have a broader social network through dancing and just feel better in every way.

Q. What does dancing mean to you now?

Dancing means that I have a second chance to make my first dream come true. I can and will help others to move their bodies and express the music.

Q. What is the focus of your dancing today (competitive, social, teaching, etc.)?

I dance 2-3 hours most days with many classes at Dahl Dance Center in Rochester and studying the DVIDA syllabus in my home studio. Every Saturday you can find me taking classes and dancing in the Twin Cities. I hope to pass bronze rhythm certification later this Fall and bronze smooth next June.

Q. Any dancing role models, mentors or inspirations?

Too many to specifically mention other than I appreciate the extra encouragement and support that I get from Gary and April Dahl from Dahl Dance Center in Rochester where I am a student.

Q. What surprises you the most about having dancing in your life?

I am surprised at how quickly and easily dancing came back to me.

Q. What would you tell a friend or acquaintance that was considering taking up ballroom dancing?

Patience is key. Everybody learns in their own way and at their own speed. Initially it may be frustrating because you aren't learning at the speed you want, but with patience and good practice with a great teacher who can adjust to your learning style, you can make your body move in time with the music. And learning can and should be FUN!

Q. Favorite dance style (could be single dance like waltz or a series like rhythm)?

LOVE all types and styles! Turn on the music and I will start moving. I just don't understand those people who can actually sit still and listen to a concert without moving.

Q. Any recent dancing experiences you want to share?

I participated in the Independence Day Ball dance camp in Washington D.C. July 2-8 this year. The camp was amazing with many excellent teachers and fellow dancers. I especially enjoyed the classes with Maksim Chmerkovskiy. I would highly recommend it to take your dancing to a higher level.



The reason I started dancing can be summed up in a word: prom. I was young, carefree, and had no idea how I was going to spend an entire evening at this event where the primary activities included dancing. Within two weeks we had a group of ten people ready to take on Prom with our new moves. Prom finally came. We had our tuxes, our expensive dinner, our limo, and now it was time for the main event: dancing. This is when I learned a very important lesson. While big band music

(e.g.Swing Music) was all the rage in the 1920s, it seems that since that time, it has somewhat gone out of fashion. We sat around for three hours listening to Usher, Little John, and Mariah Carey, but no swing music. At the end of the night, after pleading with the DJ for three hours, he finally played us our one swing song. The last song of the

night, which we had been anxiously been waiting for, was swing. We danced it. It was great. I was hooked.

I continued dancing through high-school and even started a dance club that still meets regularly. Upon moving to Minnesota, I joined the U of M's Ballroom Dance Club and got introduced to competitive dancing. Thanks to the blooming dance community in

Minnesota, I have been able to learn more and more and more about dance even after graduation. This community has been an incredible source of support and inspiration I am grateful for that every day. I continue to compete in Adult Amateur Standard with my partner Sehyun and we hope that before long you will be able to read about us bringing Minnesota to the podium at Nationals in the championship division.









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How Dancing And Competing Has Affected My Life By Gary Narducci

That can I say that hasn't been said? In July of 1996 I was recently divorced and in order to maintain my sanity and peace of mind, I started taking ballroom dance lessons. I had envisioned dancing all my life, when as an early teen, a family friend taught me some basic steps. Her intent was to have a dance partner at a local community center. Ever since then, I had wished I had continued dancing.

After the divorce, I decided to sign up for a short package at The Dancers Studio, to see if I liked it. The result, I was hooked. I decided to do one of my studios showcases scheduled for the following September. The choice was to master ChaCha for that event. I was as nervous as one could possibly be. I didn't even want to social dance, because it was too nerve racking. I made more mistakes than I felt was acceptable. However, I had been bitten by the bug. I started planning and dreaming of competing with my instructor.

My first competition was just over one year later and was sponsored by The Dancers Studio. I did beginner Bronze Waltz, Tango, Foxtrot, ChaCha, Rhumba, and Swing. As a related aside, I was a teacher of electronics, a working professional musician and Real Estate salesperson. I thought I was used to being in front of a crowd. Little did I know that I would get the worst case of "cotton mouth" and butterflies I had ever experienced in my life.

No matter how much reassurance I received, from other dancers or my instructor, it did little or no good. I was convinced I was going to do poorly. I committed every competition taboo you could imagine. I walked out on the dance floor with my head down. My lips moved as I silently counted 1-2-3-4 &...T-A-N-G-O, I watched my feet, my frame fell apart. The list is endless. Then the awards portion came. I received two firsts and four seconds and thirds. In fact, when they announced First Place for Tango I yelled "What!" and did a double take. This couldn't be right!

In spite of the negative things I was telling myself, a louder voice said keep going. I was determined to become a better dancer. I performed at every showcase I could get involved with and entered as many competitions as time and money would allow. Subsequently, I danced at Twin City Open and Wisconsin State. The motivation and successes of each event spurred me on. Each showcase and competition inspired me to become a better dancer. Normally, I am not

an intensely competitive person. It soon became an issue of personal best. I did not care who I was competing against. However, I felt better after events where my categories were contested.

At a later point, I felt I was ready for Silver. I moved into Pre-Silver, Intermediate and Full Silver categories. I now felt I could social dance without looking like a klutz. Being able to hold my own was a huge internal victory. We all need these kinds of wins when our lives take unfortunate or unexpected turns.

I cannot express the gratitude I feel toward the dance community and especially staff at The Dancer's Studio in St. Paul, owned by Marcy and Shinya McHenry. It is almost overwhelming. It has been like nothing I have ever experienced or imagined. The instructors, the owners and the coaches are all supportive. I could not have felt more of a sense of family unless I was related to them.

It remains that dance saved my life and attitude towards humanity. That, in short, is what dancing and competing has done for me.





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In Memoriam ~ Dr. Teddy Berman ~ 12/7/1948 - 7/19/2010 By Bonnie Burton

r. Teddy Berman passed away this July, after a brief and difficult battle with Lymphoma. Teddy and I were best friends, sweethearts who were engaged to be married, traveling companions, and ballroom dance partners. Four years ago, at the age of 50+ (!) years old, we jumped into dancing with both feet after watching ballroom dancers on a Caribbean cruise. "We should learn to dance" said Ted, although he later gave me credit for the idea, saying I encouraged him to try new things.

Although we came late in life to the dance party, we participated with gusto, and while pursuing our new hobby, we discovered the wonderful Minnesota dance community. In honor of Teddy, here are some thoughts of those who were so supportive, helpful, and patient with our bumbling efforts, and who encouraged us to participate in a pastime that brought us so much enjoyment.

Friends Sandy and Arlen Havrilla suggested we join them for a few lessons at On Your Toes ballroom in St. Louis Park. Thank you, James Woods, our very first instructor, for introducing us to Salsa. Teddy and Arlen worked together and liked to practice their Cuban hip motion in the hallway and men's room at the clinic and Abbott hospital, to the delight of patients and staff, and the embarrassment of Arlen.

I still remember the lovely Anne & Tom LaTourelle, resplendent in ballgown and tuxedo, teaching a group class on American Tango. We were inspired to ask them if they would teach us 'basic ballroom dance steps' and they kindly adopted us as their new students. Those were the days when we thought foxtrot steps and rumba steps were the same, but just used different music. Anne & Tom became good friends and at Teddy's dance-themed 60th birthday party in 2008, they performed a beautiful showcase dance with Mark & Karen Tepley. Afterward, they taught the guests a dance lesson, complete with prizes.

After a few months of lessons, and believing we knew how to dance, I read about 'Minnesota Madness' in the newsletter. To show how 'new' we were to the dance community, Anne LaTourelle advised me to "call Scott Anderson for more info", and I responded, "Who is Scott Anderson?" Embarrassing. But of course, now I realize everyone knows Scott Anderson! He patiently and pleasantly took the time (time equivalent, almost, to a private lesson!) to talk me through the process of how a dance competition works.

We started working with Scott, who indefatigably coached us as a couple, working with each of us in a series of private lessons. Scott choreographed and coached us through a simple tango routine for us to 'showcase' at Teddy's dance-themed 60th birthday party. When we became frustrated with our slow progress, Scott recommended Deanne Michael



as an instructor to help Ted with the finer points of becoming a dance lead. Soon we were collectively taking three private lessons a week and loving every minute of it.

We enjoyed Cinema Ballroom on Sunday nights, and always tried to be there for the group lesson taught by Shane or Dustin. I recall Shane Meuwissen sent us playlists of foxtrot songs when we had trouble finding good practice music. We also supported as many dance events as able, such as Beyond Ballroom events, the Lafayette Tea dance, Holiday programs, and showcases, either through attendance or donation.

Teddy and I participated in Minnesota Madness that first year, and two more years after that. We fell in love with performing in front of an audience, after we conquered some initial stage fright. We went on to compete as an amateur couple, and also with our professional instructors (Scott and Deanne) at some pro-am events. Although we were never destined to become champions, or even particularly distinguished dancers, we loved dancing for the joy and beauty of it. During the four years we danced, we were in several competitions, including Twin Cities Open (TCO); MN Star Ball; Snowball; the Chicago Crystal Ball; and the Star of the North. We were registered for a competition in Milwaukee this past April, but Ted's illness forced us to cancel.

Thankfully, Greg and Susan Prasch helped video record our dances at the 2010 Star of the North competition this past February. Unbeknownst to us at the time, that was Teddy's and my last dance competition. I am so grateful to them for capturing the bittersweet event on video. It's a testimony to Ted's love of the sport and his determination that he continued on with the competition that weekend, despite 'feeling winded' and having trouble getting his breath

after each dance. A week after SOTN competition, Ted was diagnosed with lymphoma.

Sadly, Teddy's dancing days had unexpectedly come to an end. He was 61 years old.

Teddy hoped to beat the illness and return to the sport he loved. He still had a lot of dancing left in him. He had just purchased his first rhythm dance outfit from Marsha Wiest-Hines, and we were jokingly calling him 'Carlos'. Paul Botes kindly recommended a good store to purchase stylish hats after Ted's hair was gone due to the cancer, and Ted hoped to incorporate them into his 'look'. We planned for the Milwaukee dance competition in April and he hoped to participate, but it wasn't to be.



I know Ted would surely want to thank each of you who offered support, encouragement, and love, both during our brief dancing days, and during the dark days of his illness. I like to think Teddy is dancing in eternity, practicing his Cuban hip motion, and working on the perfect corte', while waiting for the day we will join him and all dance together again!














ASK DR. DANCE

Donna Edelstein is a popular coach, judge and organizer of the Snow Ball DanceSport Competition. Paul Botes is an accomplished dance instructor, coach, choreographer and judge who has produced many nationally titled students and couples . He is an owner of American Classic Ballroom, located in Chanhassen, MN.



There seems to be a lot of dancers / teachers with different titles; champion of something or other. What do they all mean? How are championships decided? I'm confused!



She Said:

Titles can be very confusing to understand. For starters, they come in three main categories -- Pro/Am titles which are for students dancing with teachers, Amateur titles which are for two amateurs dancing together and Professional titles which are for two Professionals dancing together.

To be used correctly, titles should clearly state what division they were achieved in -- Pro/Am, Amateur or Professional -- what level of dancing they were achieved in.

For example Pro/Ams can achieve United States and some World titles in bronze and silver levels of dancing as well as Rising Star and Open. Professionals can achieve titles in both the Rising Star and Open divisions.

Dancers can be Champions of individual Championship competitions, or nationally sanctioned title events. A Professional or Pro/Am Competitor earns a United States Champion designation only at The United States DanceSport Championships. An Amateur Competitor earns their title at USA Dance Nationals. The two major chain schools, Arthur Murray and Fred Astaire also hold their own United States Championships closed to members of their organizations.

The NDCA (National Dance Council of America) World



title events for Professional American Style and Pro/Am Dancing is held at The Ohio Star Ball each November. Other world events are also held for Pro/Am dancers by other sanctioning bodies.

The top two dancers in our amateur and professional international standard and latin divisions represent our country internationally in world title events. World events change venues each year.



It is also extremely prestigious to win Blackpool, also know as the Open British Championships.

Within most of these competitions there are also age groups. If someone is a youth or Under 21 or Senior champion they should use that designation as well. Former champions should use the word 'former' in front of their title after the year in which they have achieved the title.

Finalists (meaning that they have placed in the top 6) at United States, World, Open British, and other major events will use the Finalist designation.

Hopefully this will help sort of some of the Championship confusion.

Gentlemen Lead

Imagine sitting on a couch watching Dancing With The Stars, saying, "How do they do that? or "I could never do that." Now imagine yourself the first time you tried ballroom dancing. Did you ask those same questions when you started dancing?

I am one who truly loves ballroom dancing. I thrill with the opportunity to

take a lady in my arms and move in total harmony to the music. In every dance, now, the partnership moves as one unit, our individual bodies sharing a common core.

What is it like for a gentleman to lead a lady? One image is that the lady is a sports car, like a Ferrari, and the gentleman is the driver. The driver without the car goes nowhere, and the car without the driver also goes nowhere. Together they make the journey, and that is what makes dancing amazing.

I don't have a Ferrari, but I do have a 1974 Triumph TR6. It has a six cylinder engine with two Weber Carburetors, stick shift and disk brakes. Even with the key in the ignition, it sits alone in the garage. When I get in, turn the key and start the engine, it still just sits there. When I engage the clutch and back out of the garage, it is like I'm walking on the dance floor with my lady holding my right arm. I shift into first gear and begin to drive. The TR6 and I make the journey together.

When I learned to drive, I didn't do everything right, though I did surprise my father when I passed my drivers license test on the first try, parallel parking for the first time. By instinct, or perhaps because I had watched him do it, I turned the correct way to look back. So, too, being able to hold my frame for an entire dance, and keeping my head to the left while turning right, are not things I could do in my first years of dancing.

What is it like for a lady to follow the gentleman's lead? Fran says "The feeling is confidence and when the gentleman takes the hand of the lady, he wants

to demonstrate he can dance and give the lady fun on the dance floor. You are willing to step out in that confidence. I trust that the gentleman knows what he is doing. He has confidence and I have trust, and when it works we float around the floor as one unit."

Monica says that she sees herself as a wellspring of energy waiting for a signal. Sending a signal and keep sending it is what Monica has been teaching me. The connection I make with my lady, from her hand in mine, across my back and so on, back to our hands, acts as a signal to release the lady's energy and merge it with mine. As long as we are connected, the energy flows and so do we. My journey on the dance floor, has been life changing.
