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
From the Editor By Anne La Tourelle

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Tips from the Pros!



An Interview with Elena Bersten

Q: When you are teaching newer students, what are some tips that can help them get started faster?

A: Don't stand and think. Try to copy what you are shown. Don't be shy. You came to learn dance, so try to have an open mind and let your body be free.

Q: What advice would you give someone who

is looking to move into competitive dancing?

A: Spend as much time as you can on the dance floor. Spend your time at the studio wisely. 30 minutes to warm up and stretch. After your body feels warmed up, I suggest starting with basic walks, first without music and then with music. Then start to work on your routines, slowly, until you feel comfortable with the moves you are doing. After you feel confident with your steps, start dancing it with music, making sure the movements connect with the music—evaluate which movement goes with which beat.

Q: What common mistakes do you see when teaching or observing students, and what is the best way to overcome them?

A: A common mistake I see in America is the connection with the music. A lot of American dancers are used to dancing with their Instructors and rely on them to count the music for them. I suggest dancers try to dance their routines alone with music. Use slow music and try to match every step with a certain rhythm. Once you understand your connection with the music, try to dance your routine with fast music. The BPM will change but your rhythm and your movements should have no change.

Q: What tips would you give to students who maybe can't afford many private lessons, but still want to learn? How can they make good use of group lessons?

A: Here at Dance With Us America we offer Ladies technique classes. These classes are designed for dancers who like to work. These are not social classes. We work on all the details, from rhythms to emotions and everything in between. So to answer the question, try to find a group class that challenges you to be the best you can be.

Q: What did you learn in your many years of dancing that you would like to share with our readers? (Perhaps fill us in a little on your background and experience.)

A: Growing up in my family has greatly impacted me as a dancer. My mother, Ludmilla Korshunova, was the former Russian Latin champion. She is the reason I started dance. At first, I just went for fun. But dance was in my body. I trained with all of the champions, including my mother. I traveled all over Russia to get the best training I could get. I toured with "Burn the Floor," "Starlight Dance Express," and performed with many celebrities, including Lou Bega, Boney M, Patricia Kass, and many Russian celebrities.

That being said, I also achieved the title of Russian champion and became a wellrecognized judge in the Russian Federation. I have my own ballroom dance club in Russia, "21 Vek," and I very much enjoy the traditions of ballroom and Latin dancing. Don't give up on your goals; if you want to be a good dancer, there is nothing that can stop you. Practice smart and visit Dance With Us America.

a rew thoughts are in the forefront of my mind.

- 1. Make sure you are dancing steps that conform to the NDCA or USA Dance steplist. Invigilation is becoming much more diligent.
- 2. Teachers, if you "push the envelope" with your students' steps, you will most likely be scrutinized more carefully.
- 3. A lot of lady dancers are wearing gowns almost to the floor. This creates a mess when they or their partners lower. Make sure the costume's length allows for freedom of movement and shows your footwork.
- 4. This one is for the pros, as well as the amateurs: when you are out on the floor, we judges see you. This includes your walk on, the time between dances, and your walk off. If you and your partner are not getting along, we can see that. It shows in subtle ways, like how the man takes the woman's hand to move to a new spot on the floor, how he rolls her out, or how they look at each other before beginning a dance. Make sure you are performing from the on-deck lineup until your feet hit the wood floor.

Spend your money wisely...

- If you want to learn a new dance, maybe go to a beginning level group class to learn the basics. They are less expensive and also a great way to meet other people.
- Plan ahead if you intend on dancing at a competition or studio event. There are many great events here in the area that are open to all dancers at all levels. You don't have to dance everything plus the kitchen sink in one event. Just do enough to be involved in some way. That way you can take part in the many fun dance events at your studio and in the Twin Cities.
- Practice by yourself! Even though it is "partnership" dancing, you must be in control of your own body and movement. This will save a lot of time in your private lessons.
- If you have a question or concern, take it directly to your teacher, not other students or dancers. That is the most effective way to get things resolved.

If you are dancing in a competition...

- Train consistently, and, as mentioned above, practice by yourself.
- Be sure to budget for costuming, hair, and makeup.
 When you are competing, the first impression is made before you've taken a step!
- Ladies, you can NEVER go wrong if you wear hose!
 Too many dancers are choosing to have bare legs, which is not always the best choice.



- Support your local area. As mentioned before, the Twin Cities has a lot to offer, such as studio events, one-day events, and national events. Don't forget that some of the best competition comes from your own area.
- There is only one 1st place, so be gracious when receiving your award. Judges remember those who react negatively when their placement is announced.



A Dance Performance at StudioJeff

y husband CJ and I were invited to perform in a showcase at StudioJeff in St. Cloud. We love opportunities to dance, and though we only had a week to prepare two routines, we gladly accepted. What struck me about this particular dancing opportunity was the context. For the first time, we were going to be "the entertainment." CJ and I have only been dancing for 3 ½ years. We finally made it from the Bronze to the Silver syllabus, but because we compete, and every single movement has to be perfect, it seems progress is slow. We have always been the ones watching others and thinking, "I want to look like that someday," or "I want to learn that step someday," or "Maybe someday we can look that good." At StudioJeff's showcase, we were going to be the ones people were looking at. We were the example of an amateur couple, meant to show other amateur couples what could be accomplished. From my perspective, it was a lofty position, one I enjoyed for its novelty.

All theory aside, the challenge we faced in preparation was to take the routines we had choreographed at American Classic Ballroom and squeeze them into the 16 by 24 foot space that was StudioJeff. We were told that rhythm and latin dances would fit best, but of course, everyone else was doing them. We were determined to make our tango work, to show something different. After corresponding over phone and email with StudioJeff's owner, Jeff Ringer, it was a pleasure to meet him in person the night of the showcase. He has the only dance studio in St. Cloud, and is determined to show St. Cloud how wonderful dance can be. He was excited to introduce all of his performers, and showed enthusiasm for every level represented. Filling all the available seats and overflowing the standing room as well, he had gathered over 100 spectators. CJ and I performed our tango, as well as a rumba. Everything fit, everything went fine, and we thoroughly enjoyed the



performing. Jeff ended his showcase with the declaration that "You, too, can learn to do this!" Indeed, people seemed enthralled with the idea; we got to talk to people who were determined to start taking lessons. I remember when the whole thing was new to me, and the excitement of "What if I could actually DO this?!" got me at every lesson. It was fun to share with people what dance has been to us, and to feel like we were truly inspiring people, as so many others have done for us.

Cinema Ballroom Takes Top Honors at US Nationals

n excited and well-prepared group of dancers from Cinema Ballroom made the trip south to Florida for the United States Dance Championships in early September. Months of preparation and anticipation were realized finally as Cinema Ballroom took the floor with confidence, which ultimately spelled success.

Five students danced in three divisions partnered with their instructor Eric Hudson. Eileen Arcilla, Sandy Goblirsch, Elizabeth Rocco, and Shannon Rohne danced in the American Smooth division. MeMe Regan-Heller and Elizabeth Rocco competed in Latin. Shannon Rohne and Sandy Goblirsch danced in the Standard division.

Two Cinema Ballroom students were crowned United States Champions: Shannon Rohne and Elizabeth Rocco. Shannon Rohne won the US Bronze Smooth A1 championship, and Elizabeth Rocco won the US Silver A2 Smooth Championship. In addition, Rohne was third in the US Standard Final and Rocco placed fourth in the US Latin Final. Expectations were high for these ladies, yet they have gone above and beyond!

Eileen Arcilla improved dramatically in form and artistry through discipline and determination and narrowly missed the US Champion's position on the podium in the A2 Open Gold Smooth Division. She'll settle for 2nd this year, but great things to come!

Sandy Goblirsch made her USDC debut with Eric Hudson and did not disappoint as she finished 3rd in a difficult Smooth Rising Star division.

MeMe Regan-Heller made her final appearance as an amateur in the sizzling Open Latin A1 division. She narrowly missed the semi-final, but danced well. Her commitment and desire will take her far as she starts a new chapter as a professional instructor at Cinema Ballroom.

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

Chapter Ten

"Good evening, everyone, and welcome to Silver Foxtrot." Brian's floral tie was almost as dazzling as his smile. "I see a new face in our happy little group, so before we get started I'd like to have everyone introduce themselves."

The new face belonged to me, and I was there because Jessica had invited me. Well, it wasn't really an invitation. More like a suggestion. At last week's studio party she had told me two things: [1] she was starting Brian's Foxtrot class that Monday, and [2] there would probably be a shortage of male students. I was thoroughly enjoying myself in Rhythm, but I also knew that if I wanted to dance with Jessica I would be obliged to follow her into the strange world of American Smooth. So there I was.

There were three couples, Jessica, and myself. Jessica was wearing a lavender T-shirt, a lightweight and billowy black skirt, and her thick-heeled nun's shoes. I caught her eye and pointed down at my own dance shoes, silently mouthing the word "Showtime." She looked down at them and nodded approvingly.

"Well, thank you," Brian said when we had finished with introductions. "Let's begin by having all the ladies line up against the wall to my right, and the gentlemen on the other side." So we did.

"Now a little review," he said with a sly smile. "Who can tell me how we distinguish Silver Waltz from Bronze Waltz?" A hand shot up on the ladies' side. She was tall and stout. She had coppery hair and pale skin that looked decidedly middle aged. She wore a blood-red leotard that had "Capezio" printed across the tummy.

Before Brian could acknowledge her, a baritone voice directly across from her rang out: "Passing of the feet!" "Exactly," Brian replied. "We pass our feet."

I took a look at Capezio's male counterpart, who was also tall and stout. His hair was suspiciously black. He was wearing black pleated trousers identical to Brian's and a shiny, tight-fitting black T-shirt that had a small scorpion logo over the left breast.

Brian paused for dramatic effect while we all contemplated the concept of feet passing. Something told me I was the only person in class who didn't know what this meant. Or how it was possible to dance at all without passing one's feet sooner or later.

"The same is true for Silver Foxtrot," Brian explained.
"In fact, the figures in Foxtrot are very similar to the figures in Waltz. Now for the extra credit question:
How do we distinguish Silver Foxtrot from Silver Waltz?"

This time Capezio skipped the hand raising and just blurted out the answer: "Body flight!"

"Correct!" Brian announced. Scorpion looked at Capezio and smiled proudly. These two were really leaving the rest of us in the dust.

Brian continued. "To demonstrate these two principles let's do a little amalgamation that you'll recognize from the Waltz class: Twinkle and Close Promenade with a Feather Ending." It sounded like something out of a Disney movie. 101 Amalgamations.

He extended his right hand to Capezio. "May I?" he asked. She left her place in line and walked up to him. Actually, she kind of floated up to him with a lightness I never would have expected from someone so bulky. She lifted her arms as she approached and came to a gentle stop a few inches in front of him, hooking her right fingers over the palm of his left hand. He raised both his arms so that they were parallel to the floor and let the fingertips of his right hand come to rest on her right shoulder blade. Her left thumb and middle finger settled carefully on either side of his right deltoid, while her remaining fingers were held aloft.

I was impressed by the delicate precision of this little docking maneuver. It reminded me of the Japanese tea ceremony. Or maybe the landing of the space shuttle. Was this something everyone had learned in the earlier classes?

"OK," Brian said, "here we go."

They then headed down the floor, stepping lightly, rising and falling ever so gently. They rotated just enough so that Capezio was facing forward, then she rotated back to her original position. They came to rest and separated. "Thanks," Brian said with a little nod, and Capezio floated back to her place. "That was just a quickie demonstration," he explained. "Later on we'll add a couple more figures and talk about orientations."

Orientations? Like north and south? Port and starboard?

Already I was confused. Back in Bronze Rhythm, I had no difficulty learning the figures. The geometry of each dance—the box step, the quarter turn, the rock step—was elementary. The leads—raise the arm, lower the arm, turn to the left or right—were bold and unmistakable. But Brian had just demonstrated three figures and I couldn't even tell where one figure stopped and another started. Silver Foxtrot looked like it was all subtle complexities and shades of gray.

On the other hand, they had managed to cover about fifteen feet in just a few steps. Was that the mysterious "body flight" that distinguished Foxtrot from Waltz? Whatever it was, it looked totally cool and I wanted to learn how to do it.

"Now," he asked, "who remembers the heels and toes for these figures?"

The class—everyone but me, that is—responded softly in unison, like the congregation at a Latin mass: "Heel, toe ... toe ... toe, heel."

Moving on, Brian demonstrated the gentleman's and lady's parts for this amalgamation. First the men walked through it as Brian called out the steps, then the ladies did their part.

Next, Brian had us practice with each other. Unfortunately, there was more going on in these three figures than I could grasp. Also, I had missed the Waltz class. So my first attempts were quite pathetic. My Twinkle fizzled, my Promenade wouldn't close, and my Feather Ending flopped.

Jessica was my first victim. As always, she was a good sport and did her best to follow my miserable leads. The next two ladies pretty much knew what to do from the Waltz class. So I just did my best and nobody got hurt. Capezio took a more assertive approach. I could feel her pulling me along, nudging me this way and that. When we were done she patiently gave me a few pointers. Something about my "topline" and my "outside partner position." I couldn't have understood less if she'd said it in Hungarian, but I listened politely and thanked her for her insights. She seemed pleased with herself and floated back to Scorpion.

Finally, Brian brought us all together and announced his Great Plan for us: he had choreographed a Silver Foxtrot group number which we would perform at the next month's studio party. Heads were bobbing up and down in agreement.

This was good news and bad news. The good news was that my partner, by default, would be Jessica. The bad news was that I was the official Class Dummy, and I had a lot of catching up to do.

After class we retired to the waiting area and sat down to change our shoes. Scorpion and Capezio remained out on the floor and were discussing something very earnestly with Brian.

My first hour of Smooth felt like a week. I was physically and mentally drained. Jessica sat down beside me.

"Are you worried?" she asked quietly.

"Why would I be worried?" I replied. "I'm only a month behind everyone else." Then I looked at Brian and his two star students. "Maybe a year behind some people."

She smiled. "Todd and Melinda have been taking classes and lessons here for ages. I think this is their third time around in Silver."

"Well, that would explain a few things."

"They're really very nice." She paused, then said, "I think you did very well today."

I just laughed and hung my head.

"No, really, Cordell. You should have been there for the first day of Smooth Waltz. Most of us were bummed after that class."

"Well, thanks," I said, "but I'm really not sure I can learn a whole Foxtrot routine in four—no—three weeks."

"Don't worry—it's just a dance class. It'll be fun."

"Even if we screw up?"

She shrugged. "If we screw up, so what?"

I thought about that. The odds of my getting everything right on my very first Foxtrot routine were a million to one. When I did the Swing number with Cassie I was counting on her to rescue me if I got into trouble. Now I would be responsible for our success or failure, and I hated the thought of letting Jessica down.

Was I ready for this? ■

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ASK DR. DANCE

Donna Edelstein is a popular coach, judge, and organizer of the Snow Ball DanceSport Competition. Paul Botes is an accomplished dance instructor, coach, choreographer, and judge who has produced many nationally titled students and couples. He is an owner of American Classic Ballroom, located in Chanhassen, MN.

I have been dancing for just over a year and taking lessons once per week. In the beginning I felt like I was making progress fairly rapidly but now I feel that I have plateaued and am not seeing as much improvement. I am not sure if I should try and invest in more lessons (a challenge, but could move to 2 a week), take advantage of visiting coaches to get a new perspective, change teachers, or maybe spend more time on group lessons to supplement... I have even thought about trying to find a practice partner. What would you recommend?



She Said:

Students generally make a lot of progress in their first year of dancing because everything they do is new and an improvement.

Everyone goes through plateaus in their dancing. The best dancers have fought through many plateaus – sometimes long ones – in order to reach the next breakthrough.

If you understand your teacher's way of communicating and feel

that your teacher is knowledgeable, then stay put.

If you and your teacher don't communicate well, then perhaps take a few lessons with various teachers to see if there is a better fit.

Coaching is always beneficial if you work with the same coach frequently enough for them to reinforce the concepts they have presented to you.

Practice is always a good idea. You can improve by practicing alone or with a partner.

Good luck in the next phase of your dancing.

He Said:

The learning curve is sharp initially, because some of the basic concepts are easy to master. One, therefore, thinks that he is making a lot of progress. As you get down to the more detailed technique of dancing, progress will be much slower and it requires more dedication. If you have a video of yourself dancing in the early stages of your development, it may make you feel better when you compare it to a more recent video of



your dancing. It may serve to make you realize that you are indeed getting better. If you still feel dissatisfied with your progress, discuss this with your teacher before making a rash decision. Learning is an individual endeavor and people learn at different speeds. A common mistake is often to compare yourself to another student who has been taking lessons for about the same time and who seems to be much better than you. You don't really know how much individual effort another person devotes to his dancing, so a comparison is a slippery slope. If all else fails, by all means, try a different teacher or a coaching lesson with an established coach with a proven track record. Good luck!

Triter Harvey MacKay, a Minnesota native who is a best-selling author primarily about business matters, is quoted as saying, "Find something you love to do and you'll never have to work a day in your life." Some people, like my instructor Monica Mohn and Cheek To Cheek Studio owner Harry Benson, live that quote. May I say that I envy them. Maybe if I was a full time writer? But that's another story.

I greatly appreciate what Monica, Harry, and many others—professional and amateur dancers—have done for me in the world of ballroom dancing. My sixth dance day was a lesson with Monica where I improved on some of the things I had learned on the getaway. I have found that the blending of group lessons and private instruction is the most effective way for me to improve. I couple that with dancing at home with Fran, where I try out things I've learned. I enjoy the mixture of social dancing, showcases, and lessons because I continue to learn more ways to float across the dance floor. Fran and I are again planning to dance in a showcase.

When I first learned to lead a shoulder check as part of a


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routine to perform in a showcase, Monica taught Fran to caress my cheek as I led her back from the check. We're supposed to be romantic, aren't we? Well, sometimes when the monster dances socially with other ladies, it tells them about the caress. Almost no one does it with me. However, I recently



danced with an instructor who shall remain nameless. I led a shoulder check after telling her what Fran does. I got quite a surprise. Instead of a caress, or raising her arm straight up, she gave me a light tap on the chin. I almost didn't tell Fran about that one. Instead of a tip from a pro, I got a tap. Fun.
